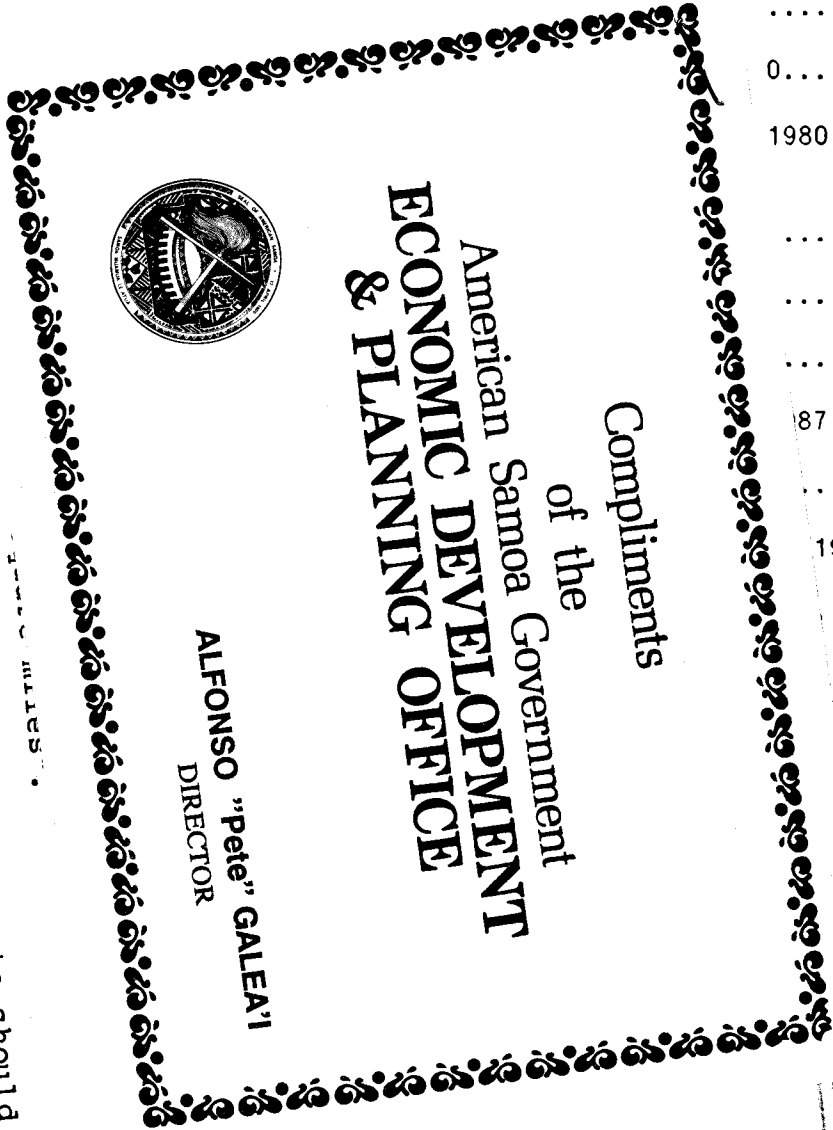

POPULATION

The 1988 mid-year population estimate for American Samoa is 37,450, an increase of about 1.85 percent since 1987 and 14.8 percent since 1980. The population is projected at 39,660 in 1990 and 48,200 in the year 2000.

The population growth in American Samoa has occurred in the face of a continuous out-migration trend of about 382 net out-migrations per year since 1974.

The Eastern District still constituted more than 50 percent of the population of Tutuila although there has been a general trend toward the Western District (36 percent in 1974 to 41 percent in 1980). The Manu'a District remained at about 5 percent of the population for the territory. Population density is about 77 percent higher in the Eastern District than in the Western District, and Manu'a has about one-tenth as many persons per square mile as the Eastern District.

The population is young but is gradually getting older, with the median age increasing from 17 years in 1974 to 20 years in 1985. Males continued to outnumber females by 51 percent to 49 percent. About 42 percent of the population age 15 years and older were not married in 1985 compared to 38 percent in 1980. Single mean age at first marriage also went up from 25 years in 1980 to 27 years in 1985.

About 58.3 percent of the population were born in American Samoa in 1985 compared to 57.5 percent in 1980. Of the 41.7 percent foreign-born (13,415 persons) in 1985, about 71 percent were born in Western Samoa followed by 19 percent and 10 percent born in the United States and Other Countries respectively. Samoan still remained the dominating single ethnic group (91 percent) in the territory.

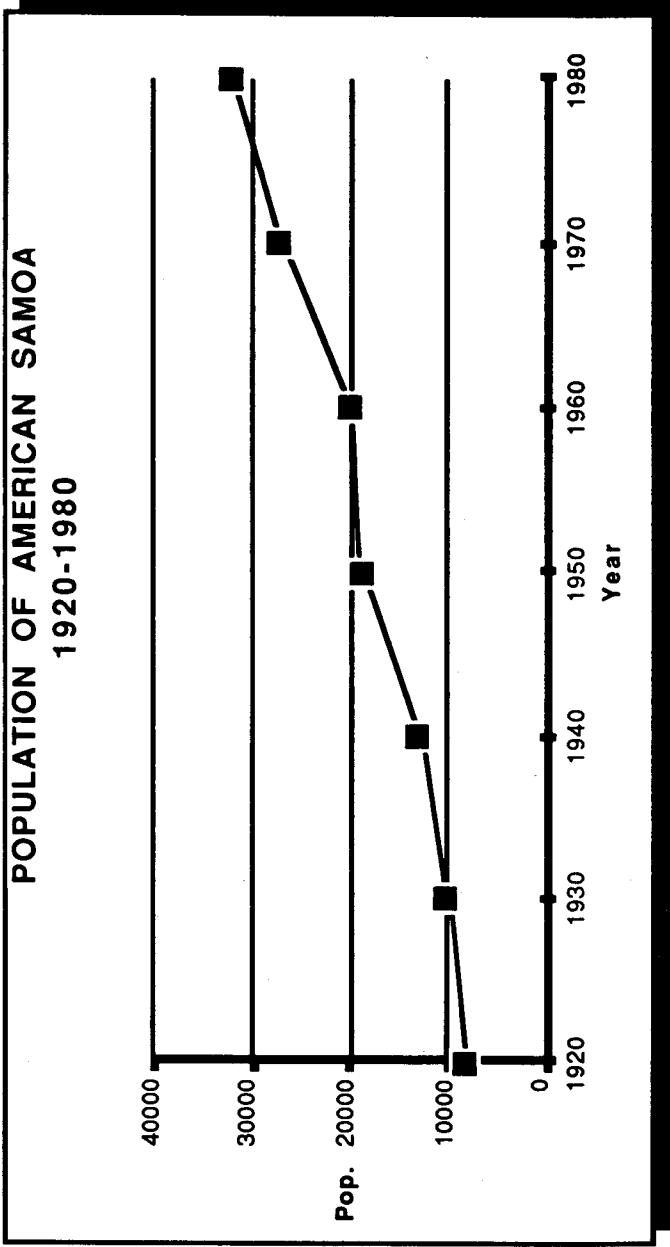

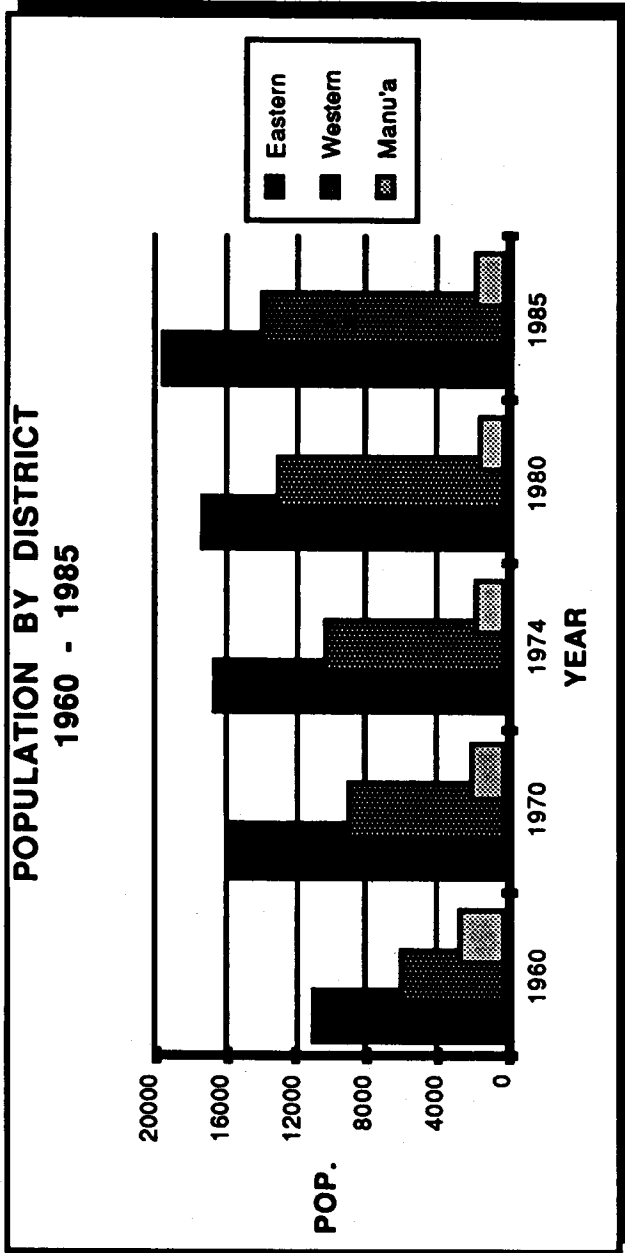

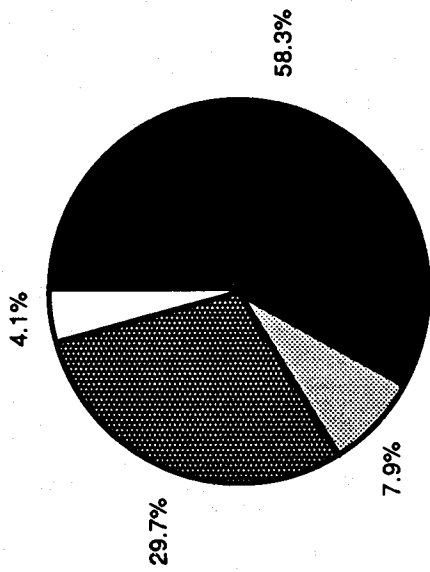

Survey of Tutuila: 1985

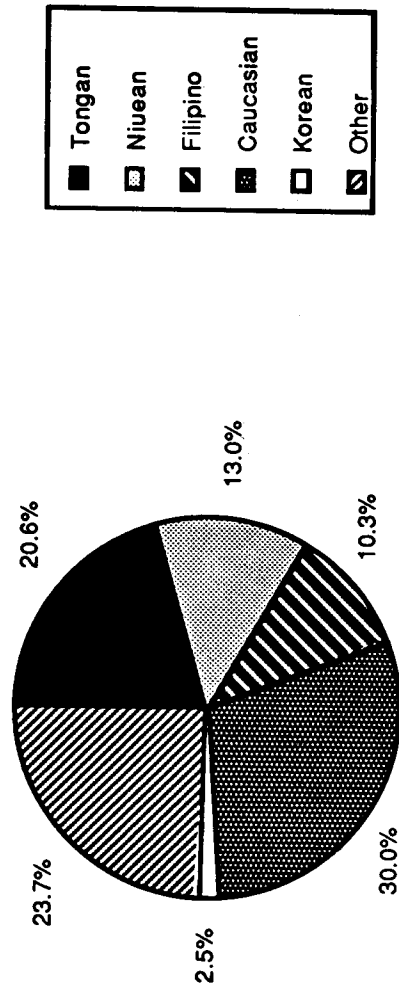

VITAL STATISTICS

The birth rate in American Samoa rose from about 34 per 1,000 persons in 1980 to about 44 per 1,000 persons in 1987. In 1987, there were 1,531 new born registered at the LBJ Tropical Medical Center. The average monthly births was 127 babies, a slight increase from last year's monthly average of 125.

The death rate in American Samoa has remained at an average of about 4.4 deaths per 1,000 persons annually since 1980. Infant mortality decreased in this period from 16 per 1,000 live births to about 10 in 1987. The leading causes of death in 1987 were cancer accounting for 19 percent of total deaths; diseases of the heart, 12 percent; and, accidents and adverse effects, 7 percent.

Influenza, like in 1986, constituted about 88 percent of all reported communicable diseases followed by diarrhea cases with about 7 percent. A significant decline in both Hepatitis A and B cases were seen in 1987.

The number of outpatient visits in 1987 increased by about 6 percent since 1986. There were 136,560 total visits in 1987, (about 370 visits per day). For those admitted to the hospital for treatment, the average length of stay was 4.2 days

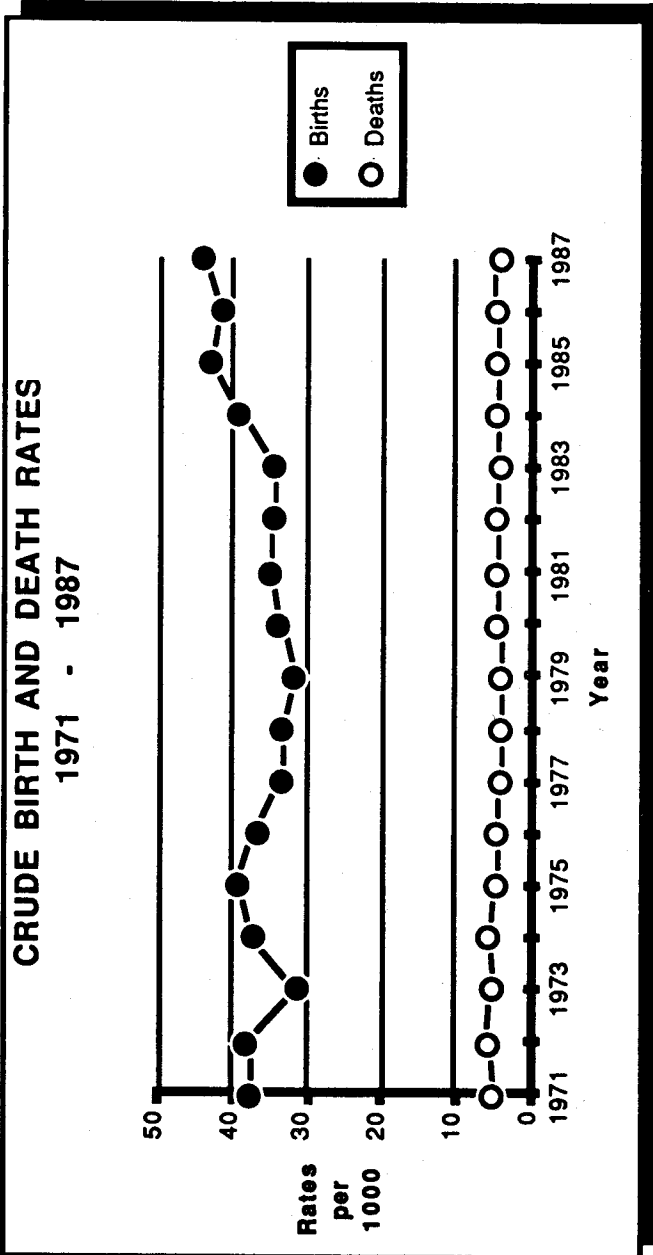

EDUCATION

14,207 persons were enrolled in all 128 public and private educational institutions in the territory in 1987. Enrollment at the pre-school level increased while elementary and high school levels slightly declined since school year 1986.

The average number of students at the Community College remained about the same from 735 in 1986 to about 738 in 1987, and most of these students were enrolled as part-time students (52 percent). Female enrollees exceeded male by a ratio of about 10 to 7 and more than 50 percent resided in the Eastern District.

About 67 percent of the territory's school enrollees were American Samoans, 20 percent Western Samoans, 9 percent U.S. Citizens and the rest comprised of Tongans and other nationalities.

In 1985, almost 61 percent of those persons 15 years old and over had completed high school, while in 1960, the figure was only about 5 percent. In 1960, about 2 percent had completed one or more years of college, compared to over 16 percent in 1985. The median number of school years completed in 1980 was 10.6, up from 6.5 in 1960.

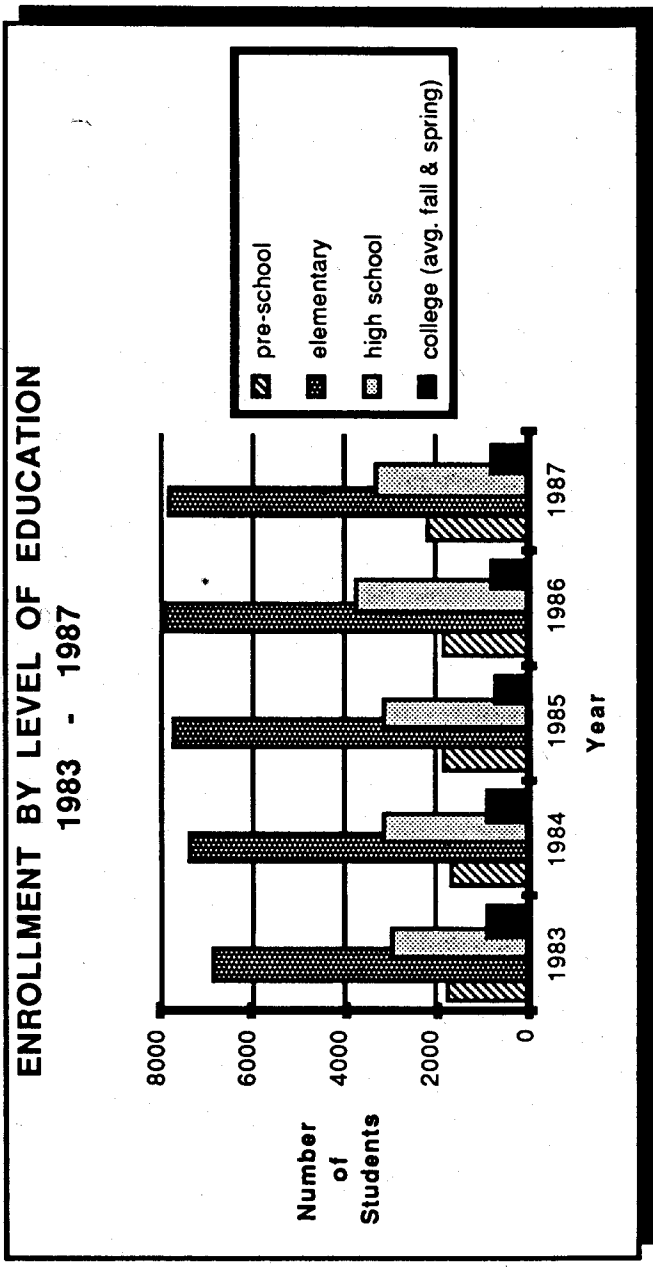

LAW ENFORCEMENT

The number of crimes reported to the Department of Public Safety declined significantly from 2,318 in 1986 to 1,969 in 1987 or a minus 15 percent. The most common offenses reported were disorderly conduct, assault, larceny/theft, property damage and burglary.

Reported crimes committed by juveniles increased again in 1987 by more than 60 percent with significant increases seen in burglary and stealing, runaway and other offenses.

Total traffic accidents in 1987 declined by more than 20 percent since 1986. However, the number of fatalities were higher although, fewer accidents and traffic related injuries occurred in 1987. The proportion of fatalities to total accidents in 1987 increased by almost 50 percent compared to the same proportion in 1986.

The inmate population at the Tafuna Correctional Facility averaged about 92 persons per month in 1987, an increase of about 28 percent since 1986. The proportion of inmates by nationality indicated an increase in the proportion of U.S. nationals, Tongans and Oriental nationals, while the proportion of Western Samoans dropped by 36 to 29% during the period.

The number of firearms registered in the territory increased from 438 in 1986 to 503 in 1987. Shot guns, 22 caliber rifles made up over 80 percent of the total registration of firearms.

The Fire Department responded to 16 fires in 1987 with the total estimated loss valued at about \$180,000. There were 11 fires reported in residential units, 2 at commercial and 3 at industrial units.

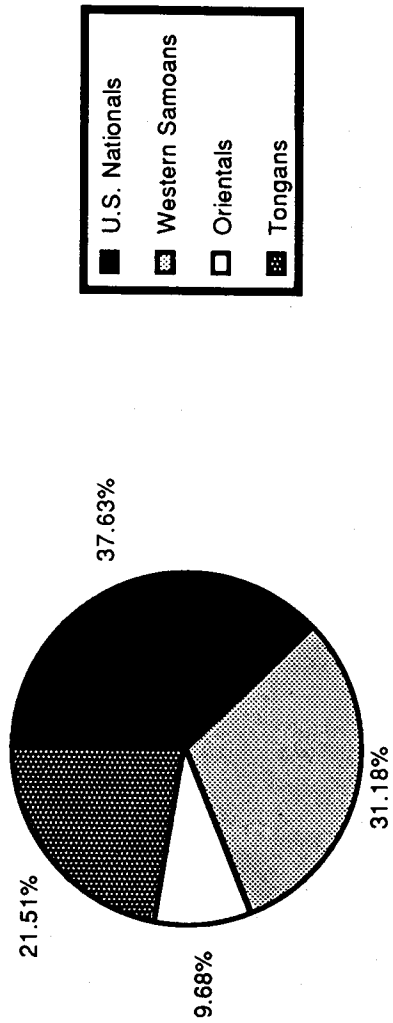

LAND USE AND OWNERSHIP

About two-thirds of the land in the Territory is steeply sloping and virtually inaccessible. This distinction characterized settlement patterns of the local population along coastal areas. The last available data (1977) shows that almost 85 percent of the land in the Territory was undeveloped.

Land in American Samoa is classified to the following definitions:

Freehold Land - Land acquired by individuals before 1900 through grants issued by the Supreme Court of Samoa. This is the only land that has no restrictions on transfer of title or lease tenure.

Government Land - Land which was transferred by the U.S. Department of the Interior to the American Samoa Government; land acquired through condemnations; land conveyed to the government by native owners; right-of-way easements; and reclaimed land.

Church Land - Land acquired by religious organizations through Court grants or through conveyances by native owners.

Communal Land - Land subject to the existing native land tenure system.

Individually Owned Land - Land acquired by individuals by means of Court grants after the year 1900 or through the transfer of communal land with the approval of the Governor of American Samoa.

The Territorial Registrar indicates that there has been little significant change in the survey and registration of land since 1975, except for the registration of individually owned land. In the period 1975 - 1986, individually owned land registrations increased by about 55.9 percent, and now comprise 23.7 percent of the total land registered in the Territory.

INTERNATIONAL ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES

More than 80,000 persons passed through, visited, or returned to the Territory in 1987, an increase of about 7 percent from total arrivals in 1986. The largest category of the non-residence travellers (47,640 persons) arriving in 1987 were those visiting relatives or friends (37 percent), followed by those on business travel (29 percent), tourists (15 percent), persons for employment reasons (14 percent) and those transiting through American Samoa (5 percent). Returning residents made up about 40 percent of all persons arriving in 1987.

Most of the people coming to the Territory were from Western Samoa (46 percent) followed by American Samoans with 24 percent. Travellers from the United States made up 17 percent and those from New Zealand/Australia accounted for about 5 percent.

The number of tourists visiting our islands have favorably increased since 1984. In 1987, a total of 7,026 tourists were on island compared to 5,666 in 1986, an increase of about 24 percent. We had 605 more or an 18% increase in tourists from the U.S. and Canada; 525 more or a 48% growth in tourists from New Zealand and Australia; and a 338 rise or 78% climb in tourists from Europe from 1986-87.

1987**

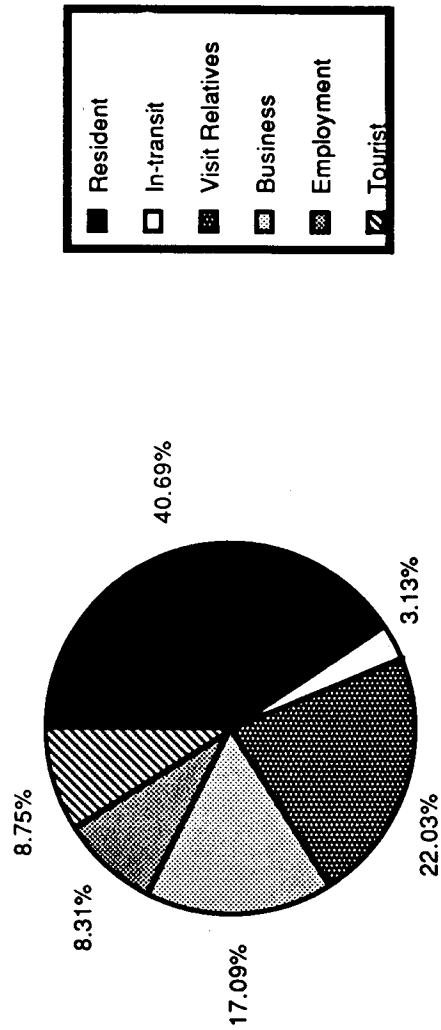

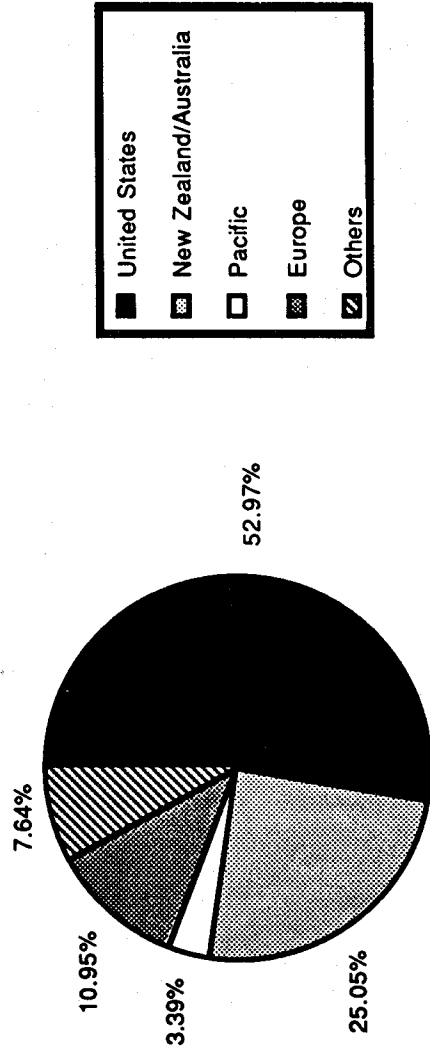

ELECTIONS

The number of registered voters in the Territory increased by about 5 percent between 1986 and 1984. District 3 (Vaifanua) experienced the largest increase in registered voters with a 12 percent rise, while District 9 (Maoputasi) and District 17 (Aitulagi) experienced a decrease in the number of registered voters.

The percentage of registered voters in the Territory who actually voted increased substantially since 1980, and was 82 percent in 1986. District 13 (Fofu) had the highest voter turnout (89 percent) while District 9 (Maoputasi) had the lowest (67 percent).

A special election was held for District 13 (Fofu) in 1987. There were 894 registered voters and 692 (77 percent) actually voted, an improvement in voter turnout since the 1986 general election.

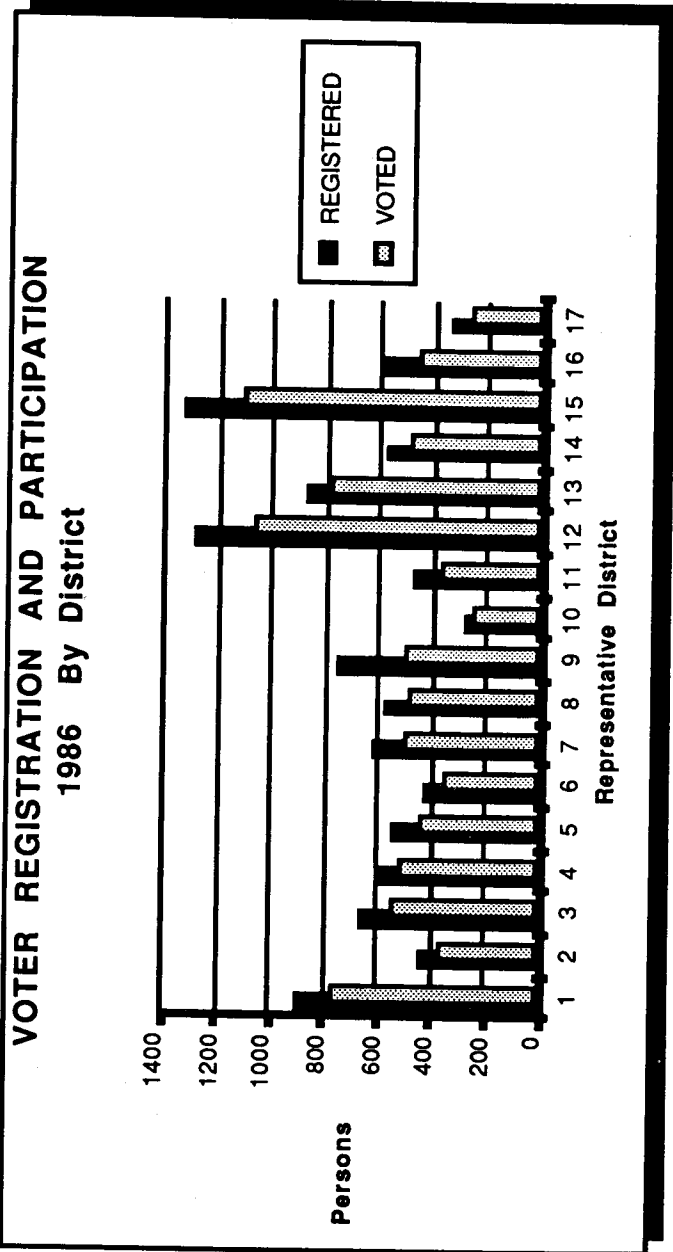

GOVERNMENT FINANCE AND EXPENDITURES

In 1987, the American Samoa Government spent about \$103 million while taking in about \$109 million resulting in a surplus of about \$6 million. This favorable surplus in government operations was largely due to significant increases in collection from taxes, permit, fees and services. Local revenue accounted for 52 percent of all government revenue, going up from \$43 million in 1986 to \$56 million in 1987, an increase of about 30 percent. Revenue collected from permits, fees and services increased substantially due to \$6.6 million in Hurricane Tusi insurance payments and donations. Tax revenues increased by more than 20 percent. Revenue from ASG Enterprise Operations also went up by about 17 percent.

The amount of federal money received in 1987 also increased from \$44 million in 1986 to about \$52 million in 1987, an increase of about 18 percent. Federal relief programs for families affected by Hurricane Tusi amounted to \$4.4 million.

Total FY1987 expenditures increased by about 11 percent over FY1986. Spending reductions were seen in Public Works operations, Parks & Receptions and Enterprise Activities, while significant spending increases were shown in Health & Welfare, Education & Culture and Capital Improvement Projects. Education & Culture had the highest expenditure accounting for over 23 percent of total expenditures, followed by Health & Welfare with 19 percent, Enterprise operations 16 percent, General Government 13 percent, Public Works with 10 percent and the remaining 19 percent of total expenditures by other functions.

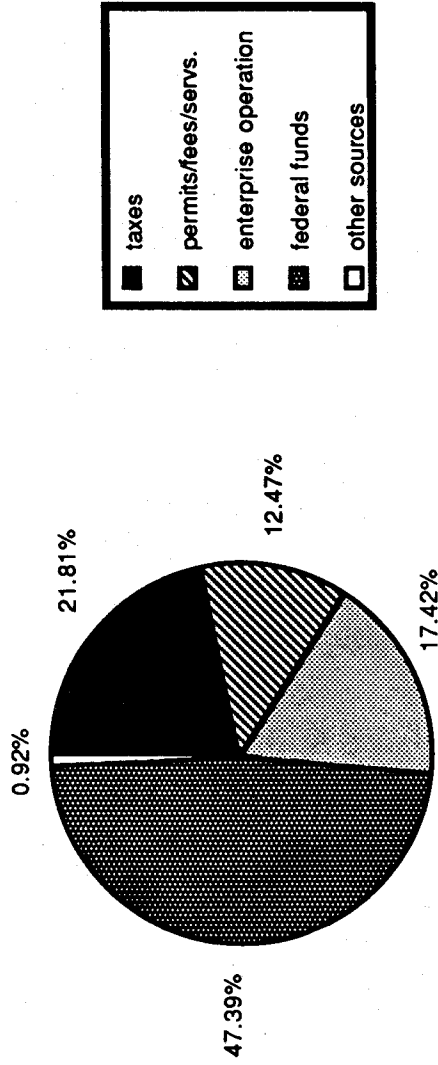

FY 1987**

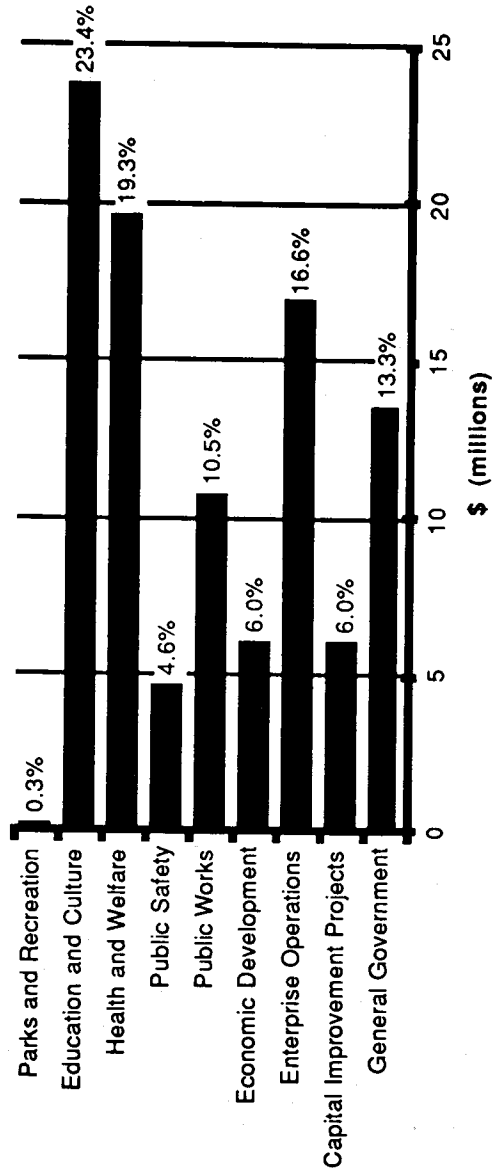

LABOR FORCE, EMPLOYMENT, AND EARNINGS

The labor force in American Samoa has been steadily increasing since 1980, reflecting the steady increase in total population. In addition, the labor force, as a percentage of those persons 15 to 65 years of age, has been increasing by about 1% per year. This is most probably due to the shifting age structure of the population which is getting older.

The government and the tuna canneries remain the two major employers in the Territory, and between them provide about three-quarters of the Territory's jobs. The ASG continues to be the largest employer in American Samoa. Despite the fact that there were reductions in both local hire and special program employees in 1987, the government still accounts for 36 percent of those employed in the Territory. Cannery employment also went up in 1987 by about 3 percent.

Unemployment rate estimated for the territory in 1987 stabilized at 13 percent. In a 20 percent household survey conducted in 1985, the level of unemployment differ significantly when considering place of birth. The results have indicated much higher unemployment levels for those born in Western Samoa (16 percent) compared to those born here and the United States (12 and 7 percent respectively).

In 1985, about 43 percent of those persons 15 years old and over made less than \$5,000 per year, with about 19 percent making over \$10,000 per year. About 7 percent of the employable group made less than \$1,000 per year, and 3 percent made over \$25,000 per year.

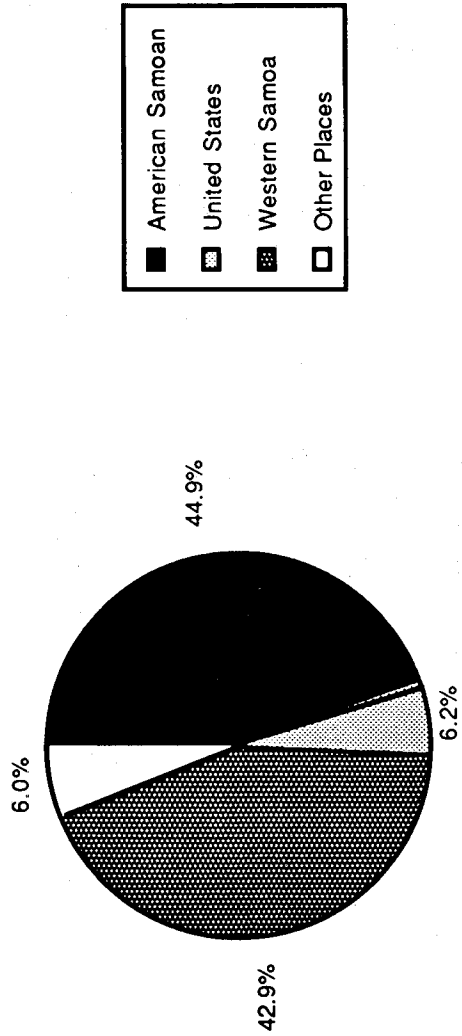

PRICES

The Consumer Price Index for American Samoa in 1987 registered an increase of 11.8 percent since the base period, November 1982. This increase represents an overall average annual inflation rate of about 4.4 percent for 1987. Significant increases were seen in three major expenditure classes, Clothing with about 12.0 percent, Transportation 8.3 percent and Housing 5.0 percent.

Average retail prices for selected commodities in 1987 indicated significant increases over 1986 prices for boneless chuck, corned beef, fresh fish, electricity, new pickup (toyota) and gasoline. On the other hand, cost of frying chicken, cabbages and coffee were lower than the averages for 1986.

Based on a household income and expenditure survey conducted in 1982, an average family in the territory spends the largest proportion of its money for food (almost 40 cents out of every dollar). Housing takes another 22 cents, and transportation about 10 cents. The remainder of the family dollar goes for various items including about 5 cents for clothing, and 11 cents for extended family and church donations.

Dollar Concept

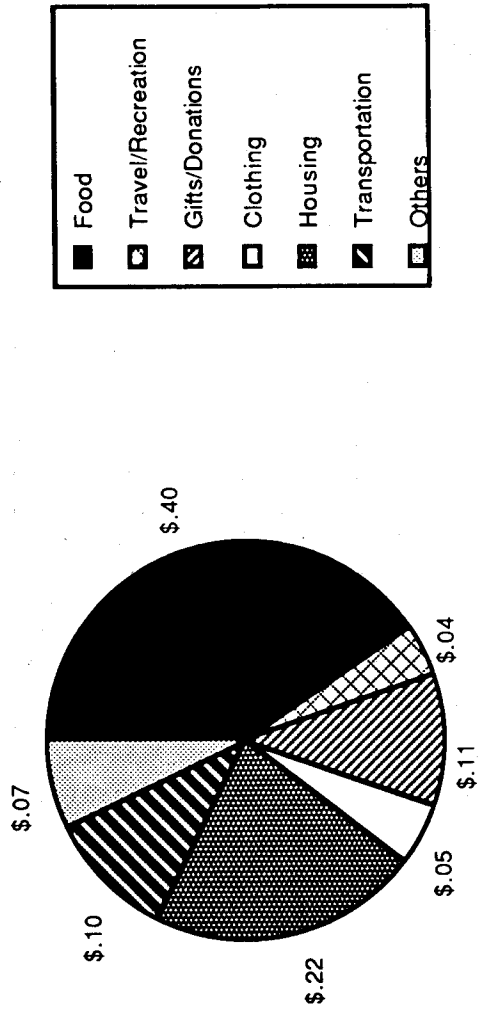

TRANSPORTATION AND COMMUNICATIONS

The total number of registered vehicles in the territory increased by 2.2 percent in 1987. Registration of private vehicles increased by 3.7 percent. The number of registered taxis went up while buses and cargo vehicles decreased.

Vessels entering American Samoa declined by about 4 percent since 1986 due to a decline in the number of yachts and military vessels entering the territory. Out of the 954 vessels entered, more than 40 percent were fishing vessels, 22 percent were yachts, 18 percent freighter, and the remainder were made up of local boats, tankers, military ships and others.

Inward bound cargo exceeded outward cargo by about 270 percent. Of the 860,000 tons of inward cargo, 77 percent were dry tonnage, 22 percent petroleum oil and 1 percent vegetable oil.

The number of telephones in the territory increased by 7 percent while the number of overseas call jumped by over 14 percent from 1986 to 1987. As in 1986, the number of telegrams handled declined by 2 percent and subscribers went down from 80 to 74 in 1987.

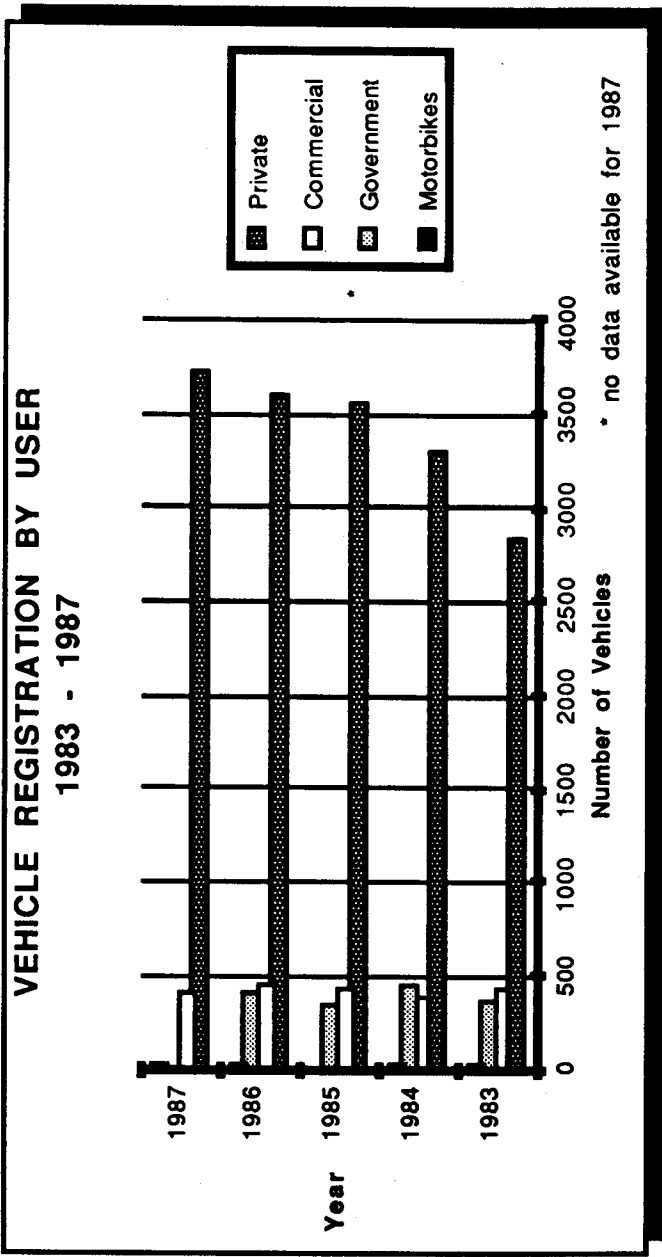

AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES

The volume of fruits and vegetables sold at the Farmers' Market in Fagatogo has dropped since 1986. There were about 900,000 lbs of bananas sold in 1987 compared to about 850,000 in 1986. The quantity of taros declined by about 20 percent in the same period.

There were 201 farms in the territory in 1980 that were producing for sale, and about 47 percent of those were located in Tualauta County in the Western District. Most of the commercial farming operations were mixed, producing poultry and livestock as well as crops.

The number of local fishing boats declined by about 41 percent resulting in much lower catch (about 250,000 lbs) in 1987. Of this total catch, 67 percent were from trolling, 19 percent from a combination of trolling and bottom fishing, 11 percent by spear fishing and only 3 percent of the catch from bottom fishing only. About 3,000 lbs of fresh fish were exported to Hawaii in 1987, compared to 9,000 lbs shipped in 1986.

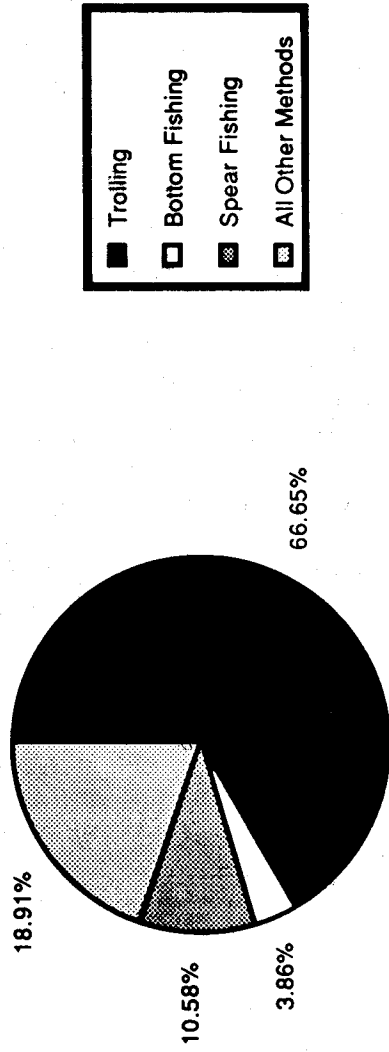

CONSTRUCTION AND HOUSING

Total number of building permits issued increased by more than 14 percent in 1987. Of the 396 permits issued, 60 percent were for new buildings, 25 percent for extensions/repairing of existing structures and 15 percent for other land use permits.

In 1980, there were 4,656 dwelling units in the territory, 52 percent in the Eastern District, 42 percent in the Western District and the rest in Manu'a and Swains Islands.

The number of rental units increased proportionately from 20 percent in 1970 to 26 percent of the total dwelling units in 1980. Over 56 percent of dwelling units lacked complete plumbing (hot and cold piped water) in 1980 compared to 73 percent in 1970.

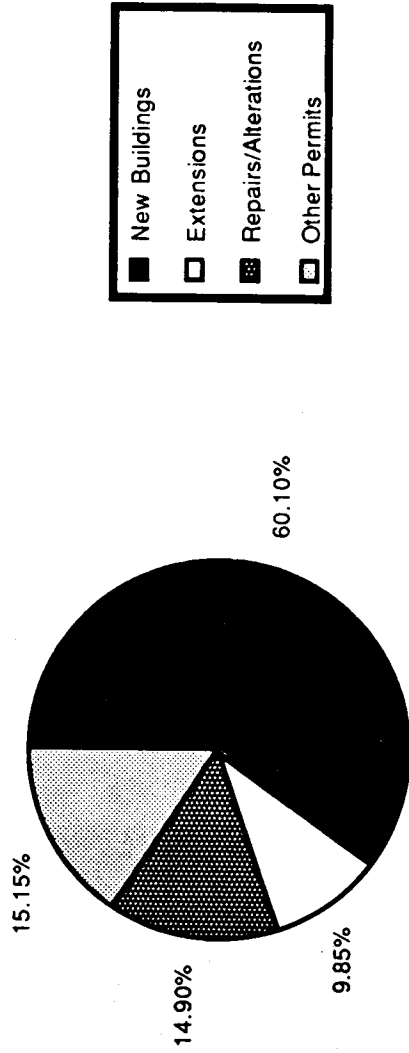

COMMERCE AND TRADE

Total imports in 1987 were estimated to be about \$346 million, while total exports were valued at about \$288 million, resulting in a trade deficit of about \$58 million. Imports increased by 11% from 1986, and exports also increased by 14% reducing the trade deficit in 1987 by 2% lower than the \$60 million figure in 1986.

Exported items were as much dominated by canned tuna which accounted for about 93 percent of all exports in 1987. The number of cases exported by the canneries doubled in 1987, from 9.7 millions in 1986 to 18.7 millions, an increase of about 93 percent while the total value increase by only 19 percent.

Imports by country of origin showed the United States leading with 72 percent, followed by New Zealand with 7 percent, Japan about 7 percent, Australia with 5 percent and the remaining 9 percent from other countries.

Of the total value of imports in 1987, food constituted about 17 percent, fuel and oil 14 percent and building materials at 18 percent. The most significant increase was for jewelry and watches which accounted for about 5 percent of total imports. Miscellaneous group constituted about 40 percent due to metal (primarily for fish canning) and merchandise not elsewhere classified in trade summaries.

Businesses in 1987 were classified according to the U.S. Standard Industrial Classification System (1972 manual). A total of 1,873 businesses were registered in 1987, an increase of about 35 percent since 1986. Major group summaries showed retail trade businesses accounted for 37 percent of all businesses, followed by transportation, communication etc with 25 percent. Service and wholesale businesses were the next largest groups with about 18 and 13 percent respectively. The remaining 7 percent consist of agricultural and fishing, construction, manufacturing, and finance/insurance businesses.

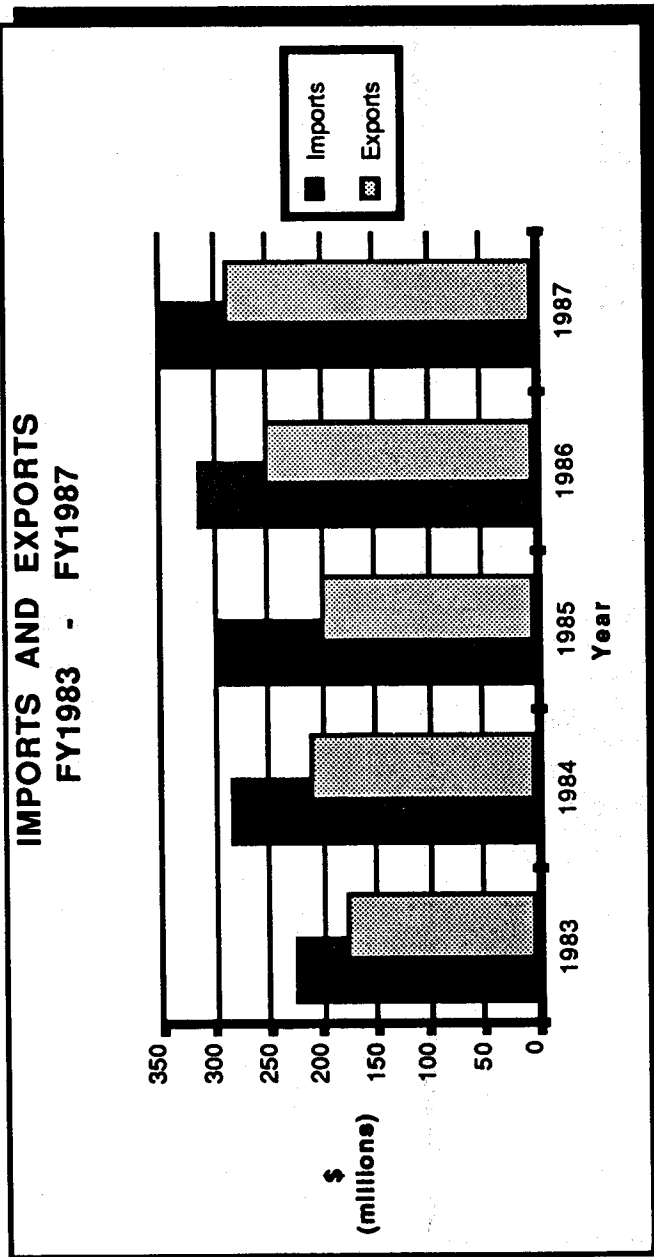

Value: \$346.4 million

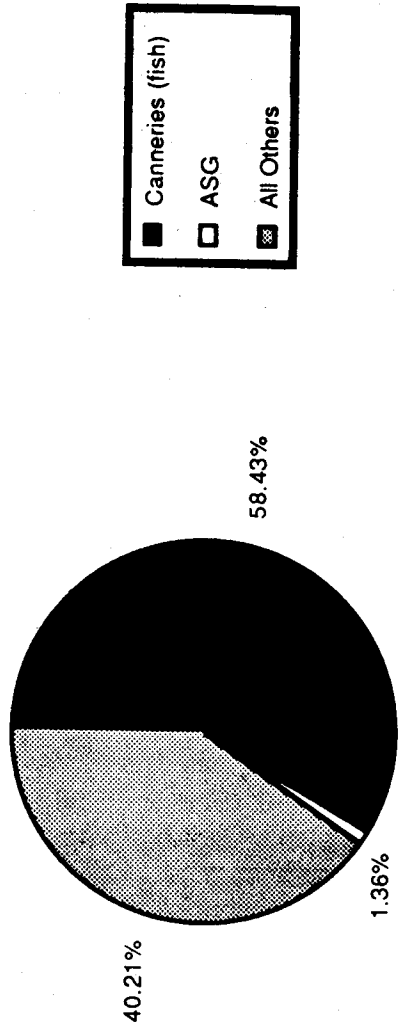

ELECTRICITY AND WATER

Electricity consumption went up for all four user categories resulting in an overall increase of about 3 percent in 1987. This increase is confirmed by an increase of about 2 percent in the number of meters installed in the territory. The American Samoa Power Authority (ASPA) produced revenue kilowatt hours of about 82,000, sold more than 66,000 (81 percent) and consumed 7.6 million gallons of diesel fuel in 1987.

Residential and Large Power users equally consumed about 30 percent each of total kwhs sold, while Government users used up about 29 percent. The remaining 12 percent was consumed by Commercial users.

Water consumption in the territory decreased by more than 7 percent between 1985 and 1986. Water consumption information was not available from Public Works for 1987.

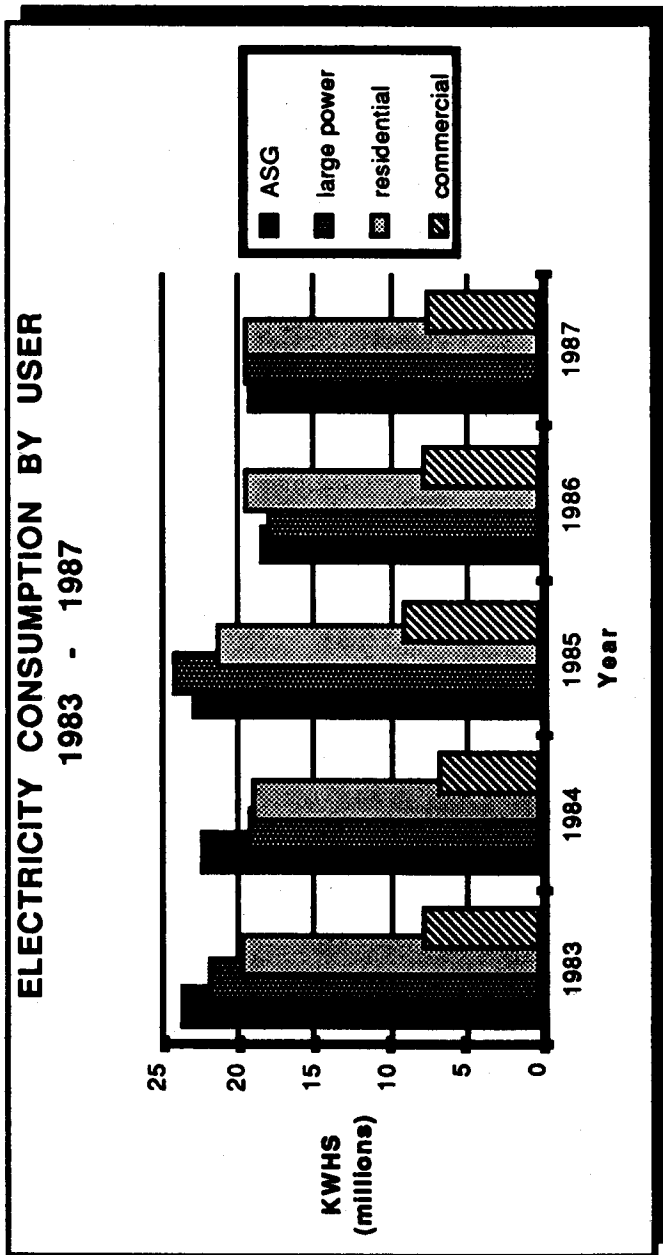
