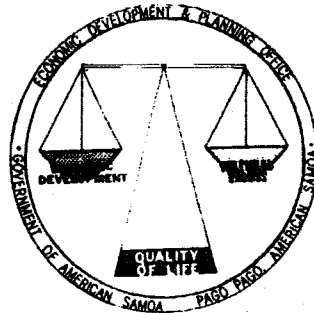


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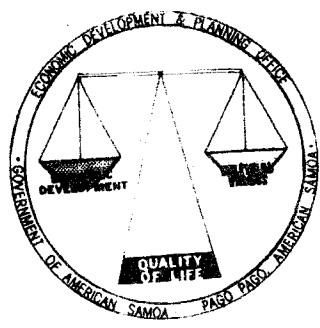
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
FOREWORD

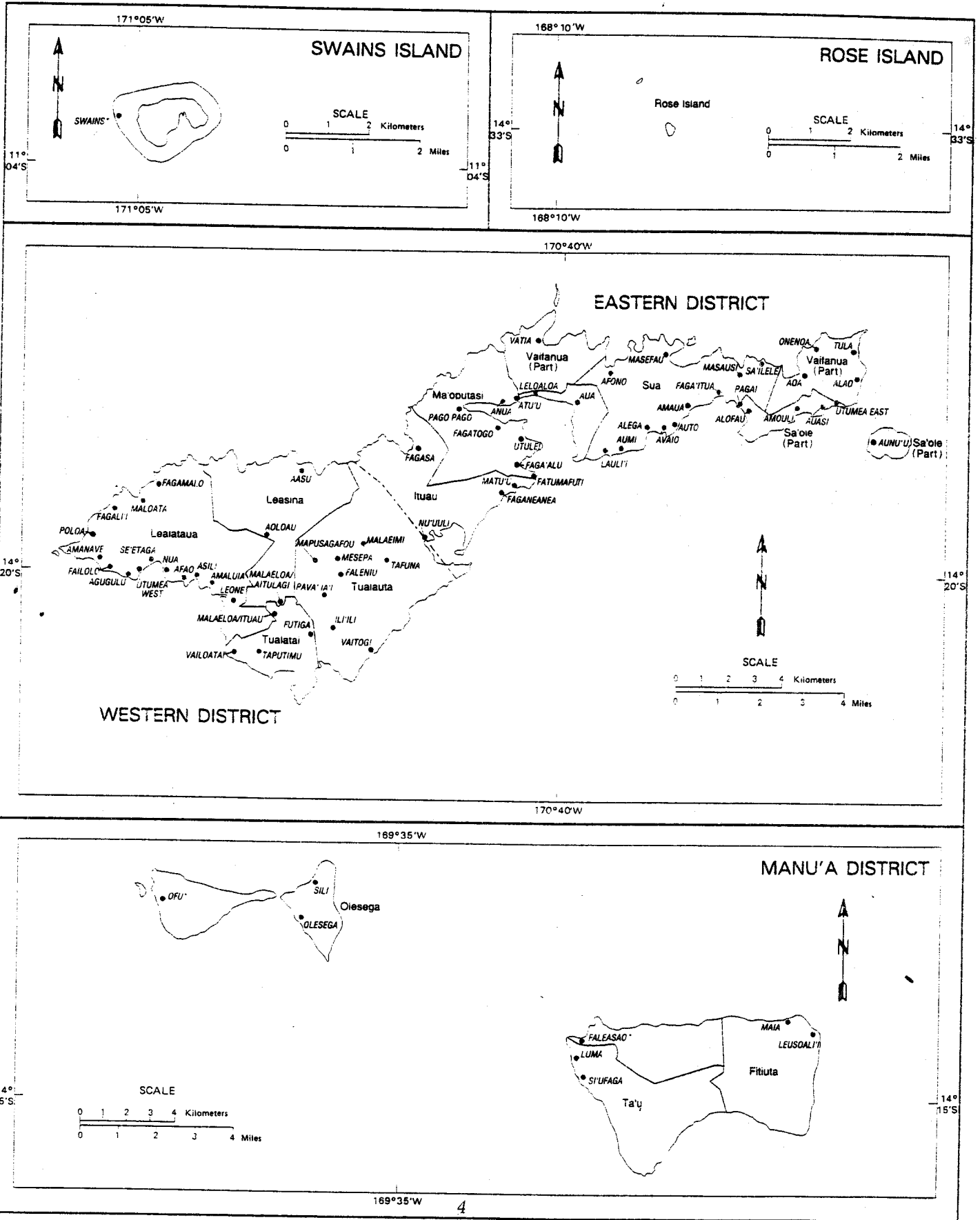

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SECTION I.

POPULATION

This section presents statistics on the growth, geographic distribution and composition of the population of American Samoa.

The estimated mid-year population of the territory as of July 1, 1995 was 56,000 an increase of 1,000 when compared to the mid year 1994 estimated total of 55,000.

The 1990 census reflected a much higher annual growth rate of 3.7 percent since the last two decades. Given this high growth rate, it is expected that our population will reach 63,000 in the year 2000. The high growth rate is due to both high fertility and increased migration. Increased migration is reflected by the decline in the percentage of persons born in the territory (from 58.3 in 1980 to 54.7 in 1990), and the apparent net in-migration of about 2,000 persons between the two census periods. On the other hand, the level of fertility (which was expected to decline) has gone up again from 4.4 per 1,000 women between 1981 - 1985 to 4.5 between 1986 - 1990. Economic development, social stability, and better standard of living when compared to neighboring islands have attracted migrants to the territory.

Our population is very young. The median age for the territory (which reflected the demographic structure and periods of transitions in human population), remained at around 21 years, compared to about 33 years for the U.S. Most human population especially in large developed countries have more females than males because male mortality is higher. This is true for the U.S. where there were more females than males (sex ration = 95), whereas American Samoa had a sex ratio of about 106 (i.e., 106 males for every 100 females).

Our population growth is ranked 6th when compared to other countries in the South Pacific Region, and with only about 200 square kilometers (77 square miles) of land area, we have about 234 persons per square kilometer or 607 per square mile.

The proportions of those born outside of the territory continued to increase. In 1990, the percent grew from 42 to 45. The distribution of persons' birthplace by age also differ significantly. While the American Samoan born population remained relatively close to the overall distributions (i.e. higher proportions in young ages, 0 - 24 years), the distributions of Western Samoan and the Tongan born were highly concentrated in middle age groups (20 to 39 years), suggesting age selective migration from neighboring islands.

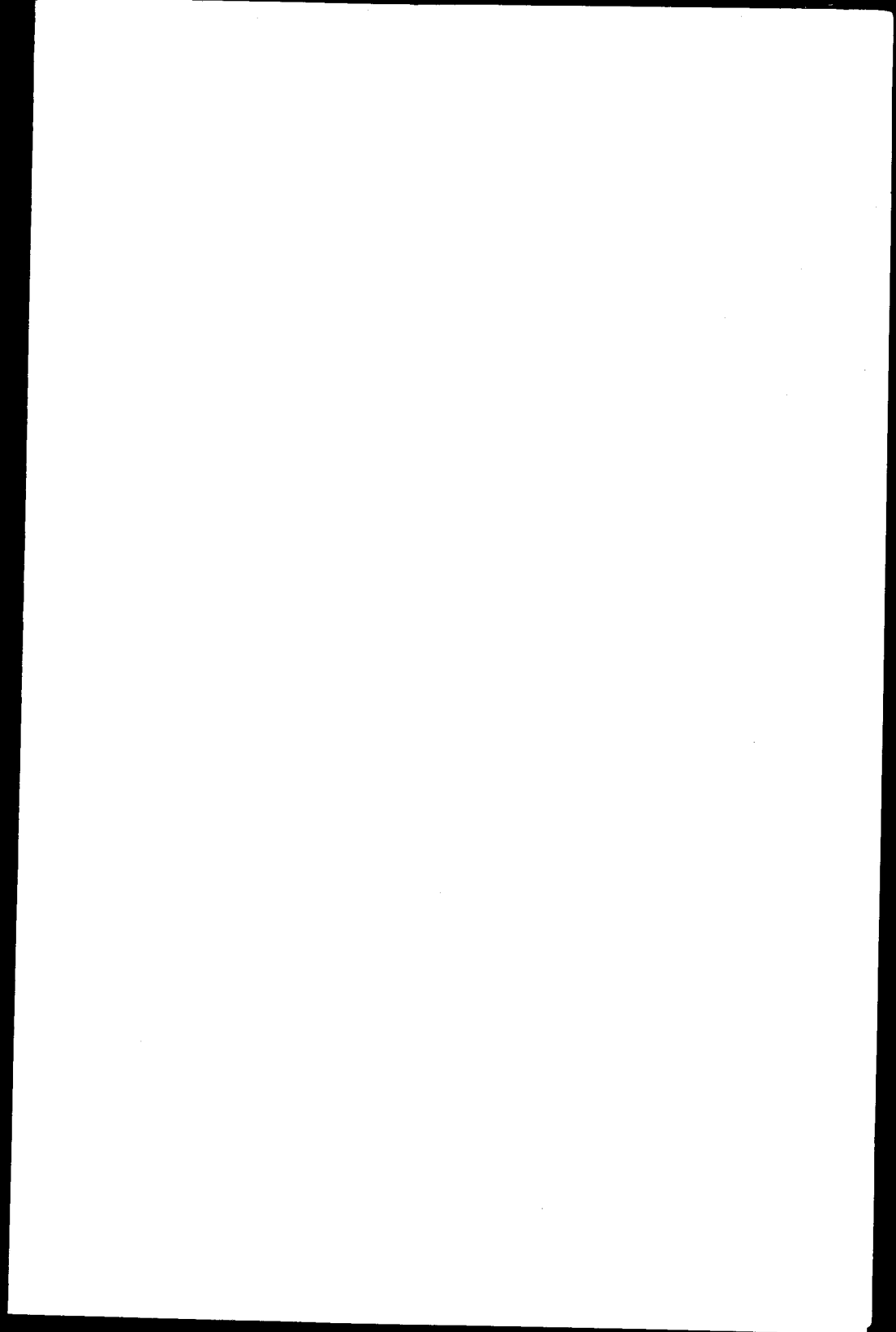

1930 - 1990

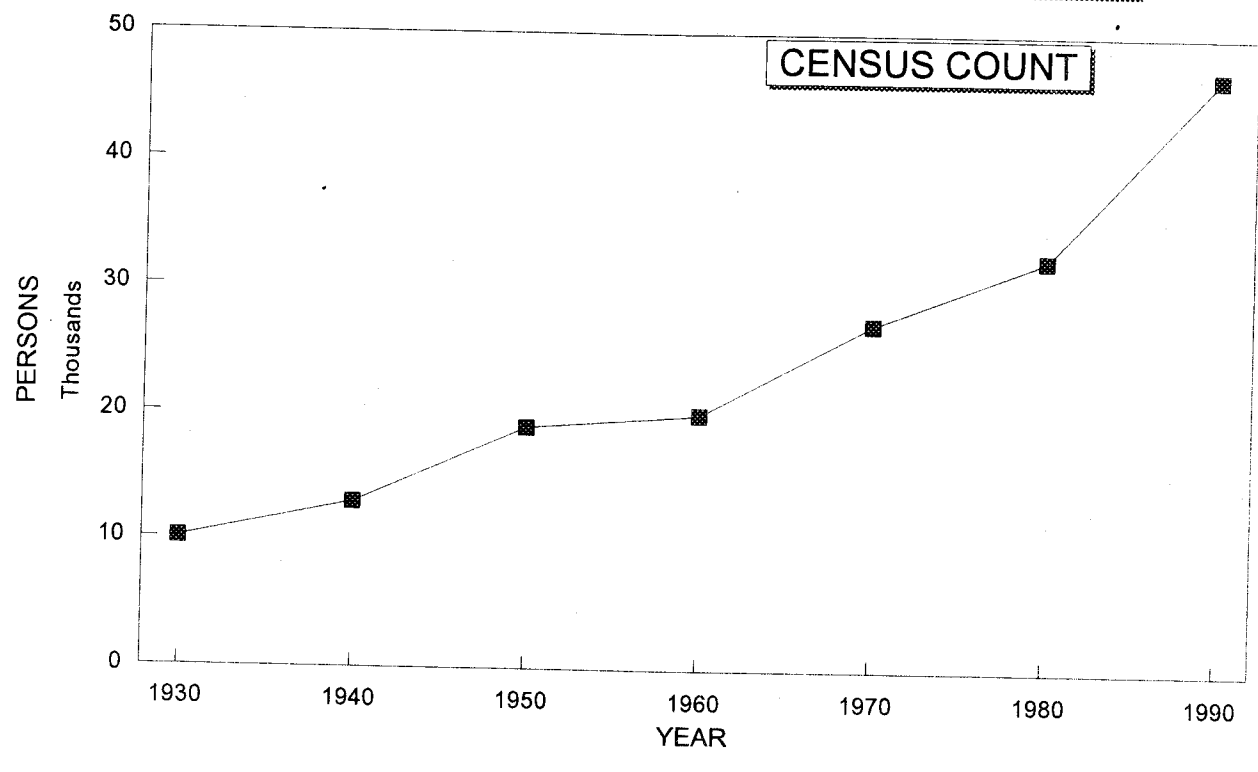

1970 - 1990

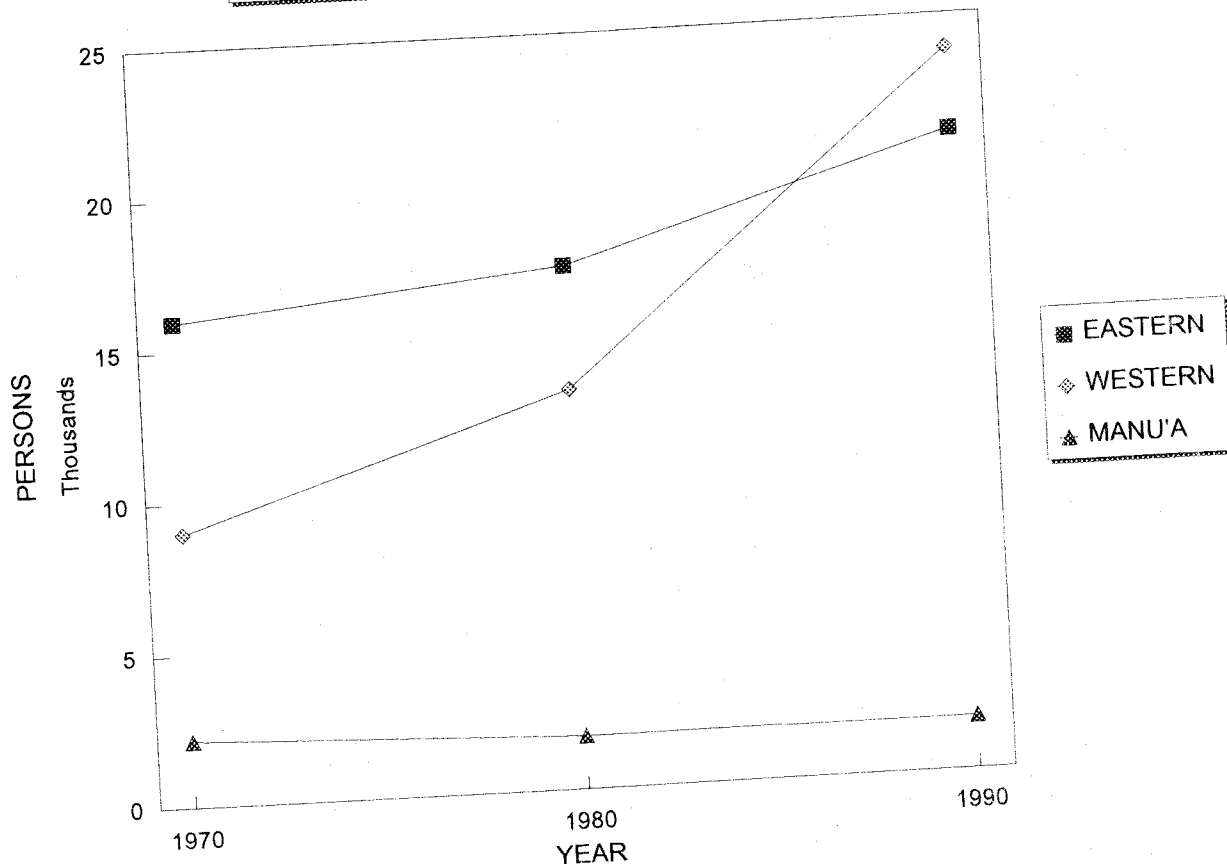

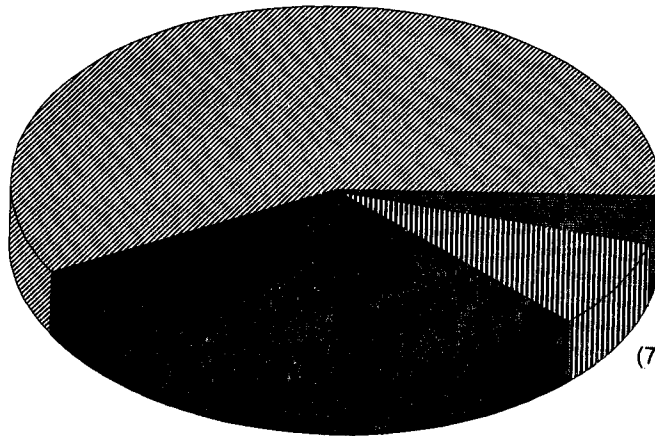

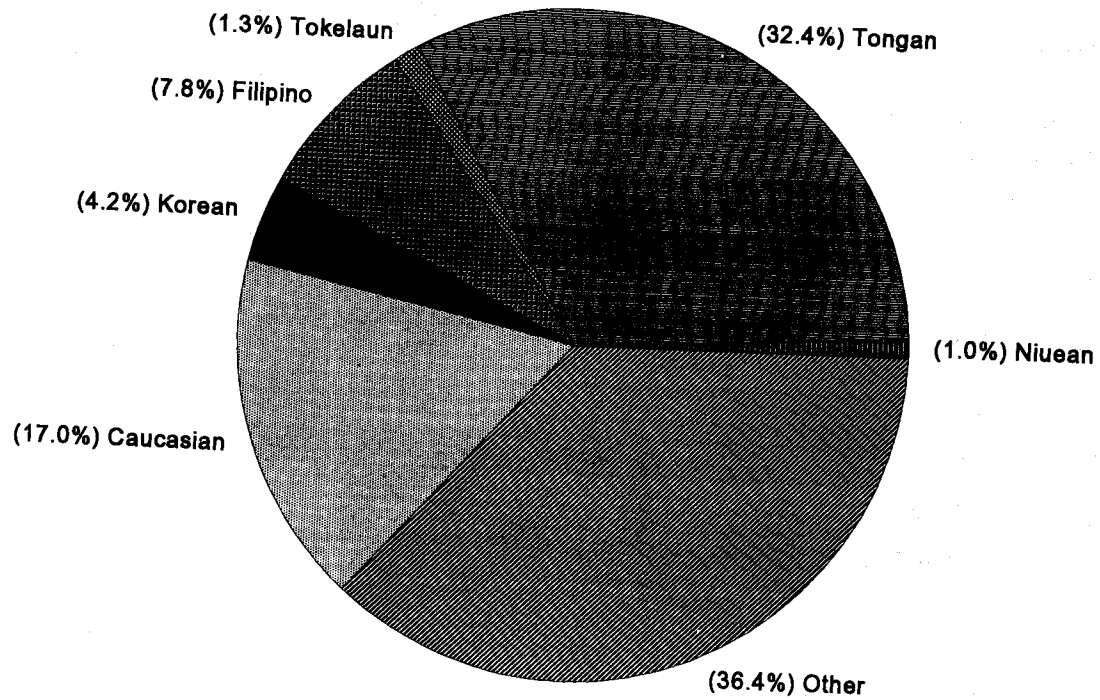

SECTION 2

VITAL AND HEALTH STATISTICS

This section presents data on births, deaths, marriages, divorces, diseases, out-patient visits at the LBJ Hospital and hospital discharges.

Live births decreased slightly from 1,998 in 1993 to 1892 in 1994. The average number of newborns in a month was 157 or 5 newborns each day. A total of 1,844 were born single and 24 were born twins.

The number of deaths increased to 242 in 1994 compared to 223 in 1993. Likewise, the Crude Death Rate went up only 0.2 percent from 4.2 in 1993 to 4.4 per 1,000 persons in 1994. The average number of deaths per month stood at 20. Infant mortality rate registered at 13.2 per 1,000 live births for 1994. Total deaths under one year of age increased to 25 in 1994 compared to 23 in 1993. Out of 242 deaths, 64 percent were males.

Total cases of Notifiable diseases reported in 1994 dropped by 10 percent. Influenza and flu syndrome again, remains the biggest health complaint (88 percent of communicable disease reported) followed by Diarrhea (unspecified) with 9 percent.

Total out-patient visits to the LBJ Medical Center recorded at 140,345; an increase of about 2 percent from the 1993 figures. The Emergency Room/OPD continued to receive the most visit (42 percent) followed by the Pediatric and Dental Clinics. A total of 327 marriage took place in 1994, compared to 325 in 1993.

1984 - 1994

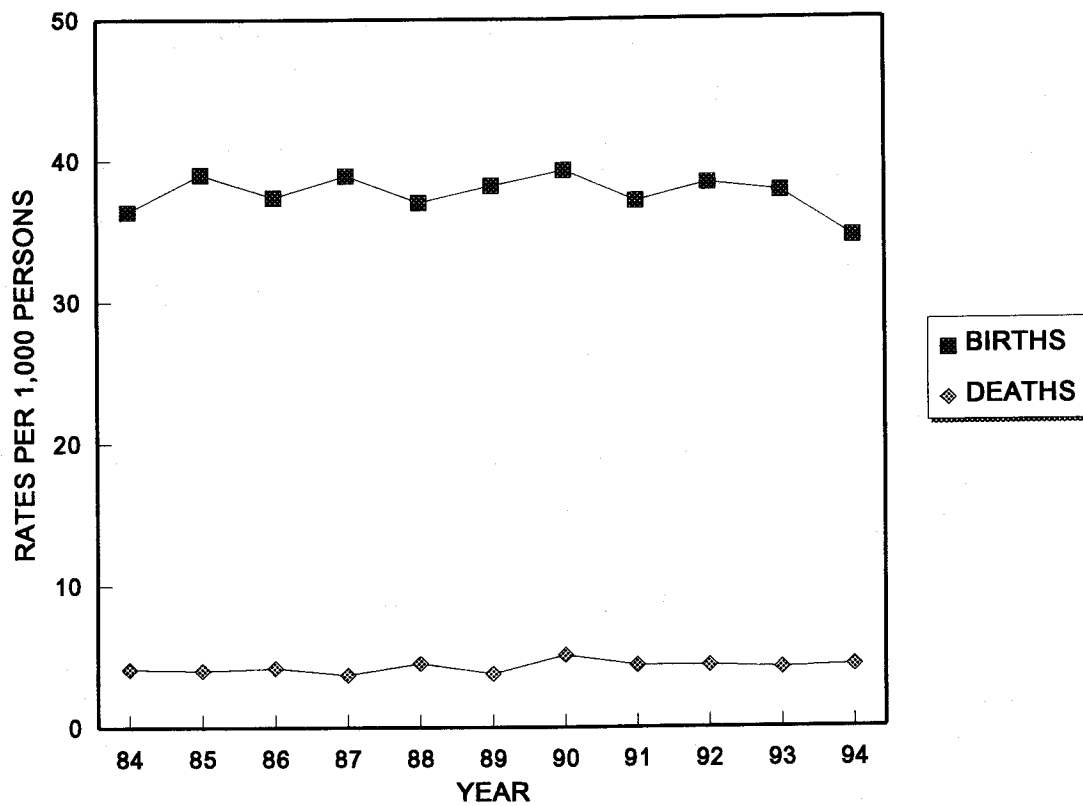

SECTION 3

EDUCATION

This section presents statistics on school enrollment, educational achievement, and institutions.

In the beginning of the school year 1994, 18,103 students were enrolled in all 101 public and private educational institutions in the territory. Enrollment at the preschool and elementary levels increased this year while high school and special education levels slightly dropped. The average monthly enrollment in all formal education levels was 16,735; 2,014 enrolled in preschool; 1,437 enrolled in kindergarten; 9,611 enrolled in elementary schools and 3,628 enrolled in secondary.

Over 1,400 students were enrolled in the Fall semester at the American Samoa Community College. About 53 percent of those attending the ASCC were part-time students (students enrolled in 11 credits or less) and 82 percent were either U.S. Nationals or citizens. The enrollment for Liberal Arts program went up by 41 percent. A total of 158 ASCC graduates received degrees and certificates in 1994; 95 percent received Associate of Arts and Science degrees and the rest received Certificates of Proficiency.

In the census of 1990, persons were classified as enrolled in school if they reported attending a "regular" public or private school or college at any time between February 1, 1990 and the time of enumeration. Schools supported and controlled primarily by religious organizations or other private groups were defined as private. A total of 16,132 persons 3 years and over were enrolled in school. About 9 percent were enrolled in pre-primary school; 52 percent in elementary school; 27 percent in high school; and 12 percent attending college. About 4 percent of persons 3 years old and over enrolled in school were born outside of American Samoa. The percentages of foreign born students were much lower for those in pre-primary schools (16 percent) compared to higher percentage foreign born of those in elementary schools (30 percent), high schools (40 percent) and colleges (49 percent). The majority of the foreign born students were from Western Samoa. Of the 19,570 persons 25 years and over, 55 percent were high school graduates, and only 7 percent have attained bachelors or higher degrees. Out of the 26,379 persons 16 to 64 years old, only 1,710 (about 6 percent) have complete requirements for a vocational training program.

ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL OF EDUCATION 1990 - 1994

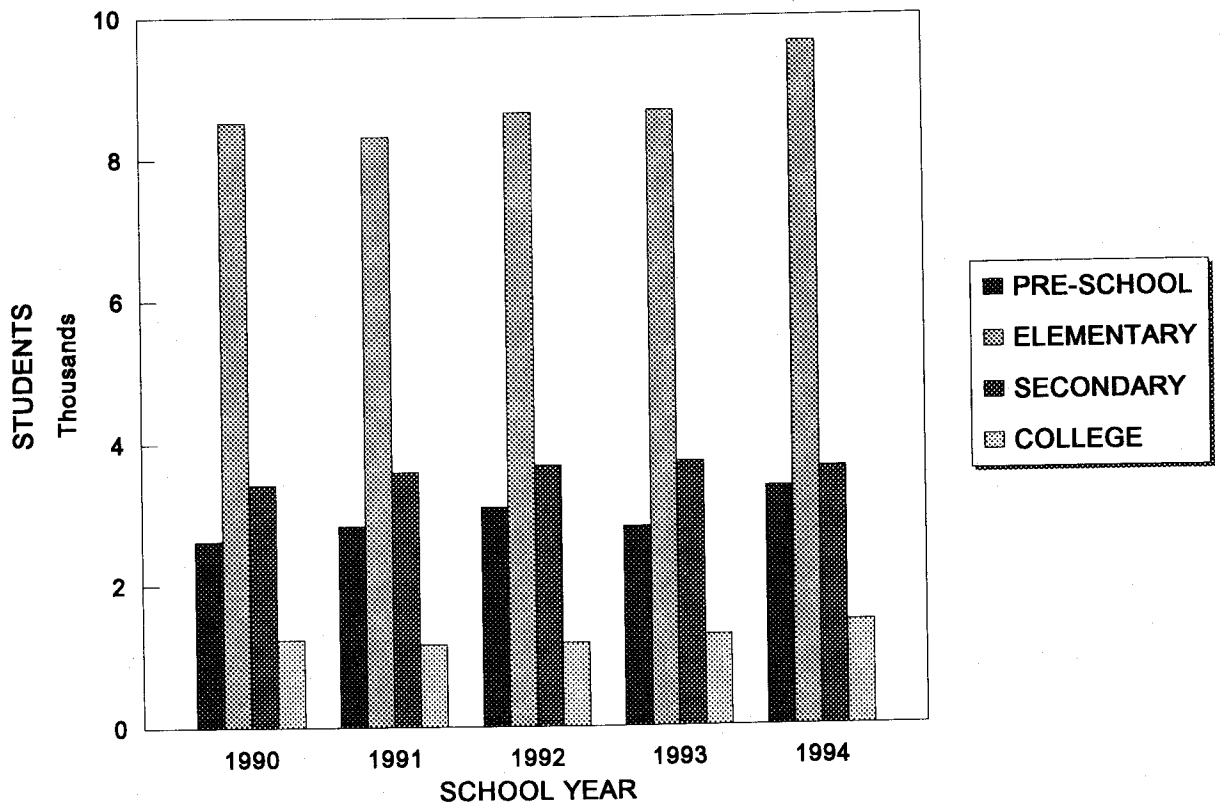

SECTION 4.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

This section presents statistics on crime, traffic accidents, firearm registration, prison population, fire and Court activities.

Total offenses reported to the Department of Public Safety declined about 12 percent for the year 1994. There was a slight decline of about 6 percent in the number of Part One offenses while Part Two offenses dropped by 15 percent.

Part One offenses totaled 717 compared to 760 in 1993. Burglary is ranked number one (294 cases) in the list of offenses. Assault (1st and 2nd) and Larceny, followed closely with 247 and 160 cases respectively. Part Two offenses decreased between 1993 and 1994 by 15 percent. The number of Disorderly conduct cases still remained the number one problem in Part Two offenses, however it dropped significantly by 37 percent since 1993. Property damage/vandalism reported in at 183 cases (ranked second) but decreased by 24 percent in the period. Driving under the Influence offenses (ranked third), decreased from 195 cases in 1993 to 151 cases in 1994 (a decline of 22 percent). Juvenile offenses increased about 49 percent in 1994.

There was a slight increase of 2 percent in the number of accidents reported in 1994. The monthly average inmate population at the Tafuna Correctional Facility in 1994 was 121 (an increase of almost 2 percent). Western Samoa citizens continued to lead the number of inmates with about 55 percent, followed by U.S. Nationals and Tongans with 21 and 19 percent respectively. A total of 26 fires were reported in 1994 with total estimated loss of about \$267,000.00.

Of the 700 cases handled by the High Court in 1994, 1,998 were pending from 1993. A total of 507 was filed and 193 cases disposed of in 1994. Likewise, 4,842 cases were filed at the District Court and 4,509 were disposed.

INMATE POPULATION BY NATIONALITY 1994

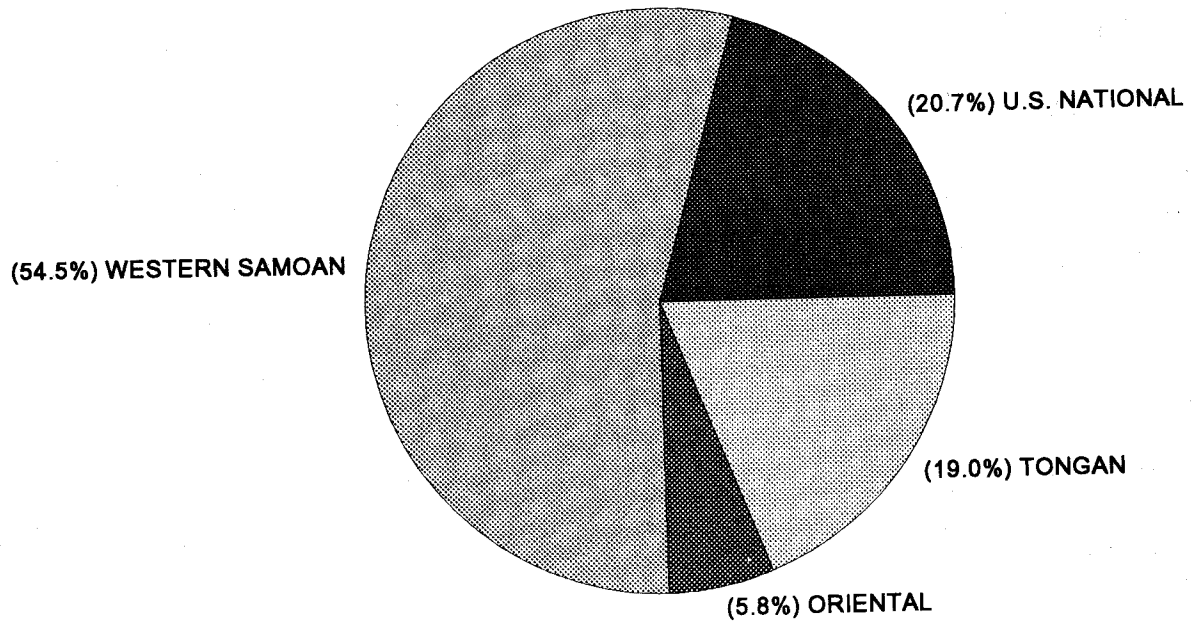

SECTION 5.

CLIMATE

This section presents climatic data for American Samoa.

American Samoa has a maritime climate with abundant rain and warm, humid days and nights. Rainfall is about 125 inches a year at the airport, but varies greatly over small distances because of topography. Thus, Pago Pago, less than 4 miles north of the airport and at the head of a hill-circled harbor open to the prevailing wind, receives nearly 200 inches of rain a year. The crest of the range receives well above 250 inches. In most years, the airport records about 300 days with a trace or more of rain and about 175 days with 0.01 inch or more.

The driest months are June through September (Southern Winter) and the wettest from December through March (Southern Summer). However, the seasonal rainfall may vary widely in individual years, and heavy showers and long rainy periods can occur in any month.

June, July and August are the coolest months and January, February and March, the warmest. Afternoon temperatures ordinarily reach the upper 80s in Summer and the mid 80s in Winter, while nighttime temperatures fall to the mid 70s in Winter. The highest temperatures recorded at the airport are in the low 90s and lowest near 60s.

The prevailing winds throughout the year are the Easterly Trades. These tend to be more directly from the East in December through March, but predominantly from East-Southeast and Southeast during the rest of the year. The Trade Winds are also less prevalent in Summer than in Winter. As the foregoing suggests, the trades are interrupted more often in Summer than in Winter. These interruptions are sometimes associated with the proximity of small tropical storms, of bands of converging winds, or of low pressure systems higher in the atmosphere, all of which help make Summer the rainy season. At other times, the absence of the trades is marked by periods of light and variable winds and by land and sea breezes. Westerly to northerly winds, in particular, are more frequent then. These are strong at times, but are often quite light, and may then reflect the nighttime drainage of cooled air from the mountains west and north of the airport.

The average monthly temperatures in 1994 was 81.8^o Fahrenheit. The highest temperature recorded was in the month of February with about 84.1^o Fahrenheit and the lowest temperature in the month of August with 79.1^o Fahrenheit. A total of 162.1 inches of rain fell in 1994.

SECTION 6.

LAND USE AND OWNERSHIP, HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS, AND BUILDING PERMITS.

This section presents statistics on land use, land ownership and tenure, housing characteristics, building permits, type and value of construction activities.

Total land area in American Samoa is 48,767 acres and about two thirds of the land is steeply sloping and virtually inaccessible. From a Land Use Study of American Samoa, conducted in 1977, about 34 percent of developed land (7,831 acres) was for Residential, Commercial or Industrial purposes; 24 percent for Agricultural; 14 percent for Government use; 12 percent each for Transportation, Communication and Church use; and the remaining 4 percent used for Educational & Recreational.

A total of 7,277 acres of land were registered with the Territorial Registrar in 1994. About 23 percent were designated as Government-owned, 25 percent Communal or Native, 25 percent Individually-owned land, 14 percent registered for freehold owners and 14 percent as Church land.

A total of 6,959 housing units were counted in 1990 and 352 of those were vacant. Of the 6,607 occupied housing units, about 78 percent were owner occupied and the rest were renter-occupied. More than 90 percent of our housing units were single-detached units. A housing unit includes a house, an apartment, a mobile home or trailer, a group of rooms, or a single room that is occupied (or if vacant, is intended for occupancy) as separate living quarters. The median number of rooms per housing unit in 1990 was 4.5 compared to 3.5 in 1980. The average number of persons per occupied housing unit was 7.

Of the 6,959 occupied housing unit, 3,256 housing units (47 percent) lacked complete plumbing facilities. Likewise, 45 percent of our housing units lacked complete kitchen facilities. A unit with complete plumbing facility should have piped water (either hot or cold), a flush toilet, and a bathtub or shower located either in the unit or inside the building in which the unit is located. About 72 percent of all housing units had only cold piped water, and 26 percent of those had only cold piped water outside of their living units. Still 4 percent of our housing unit had no piped water. More than 90 percent of our housing units had flush toilets and bathtub or showers.

A total of 674 land use permits were issued in 1994. Out of the 674 land use permits, 187 were for new structures. Total estimated value of all construction excluding ASG projects was \$14 millions.

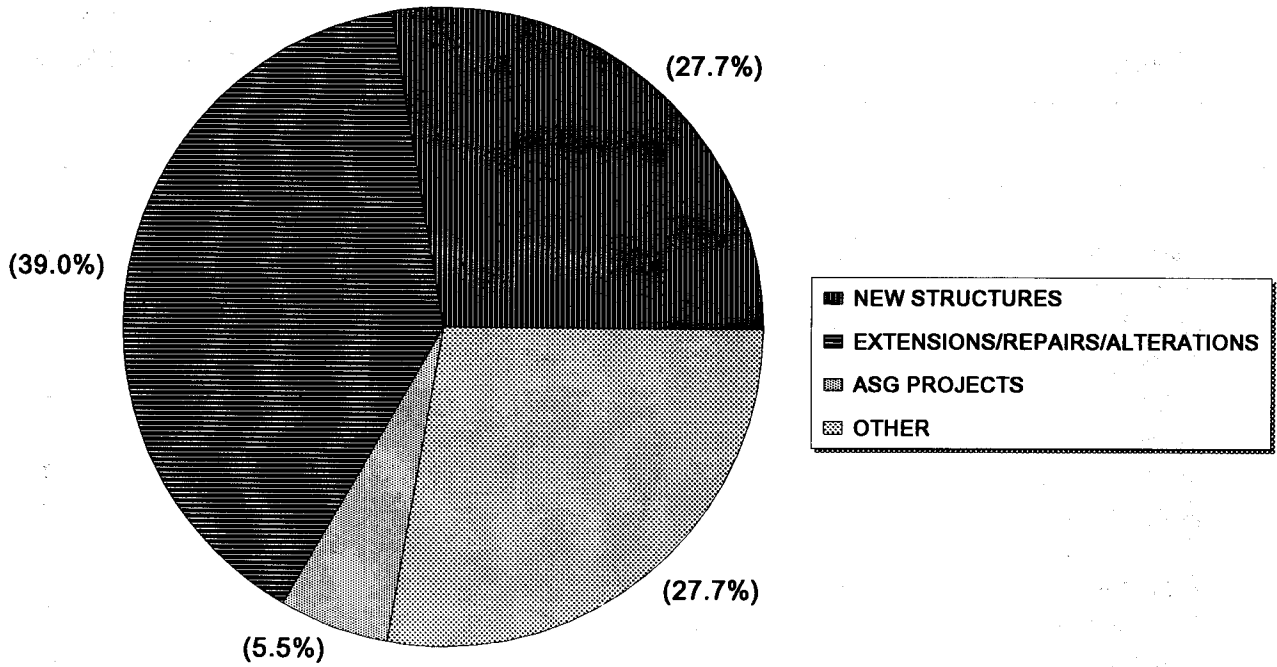

SECTION 7.

INTERNATIONAL ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES

This section presents statistics on arrivals and departures by purpose of travel and citizenship.

More than 80,000 travellers arrived into the Territory in 1994, an increase of about 14 percent compared to total arrivals in 1993. Residents returning to the territory accounted for 47 percent of the total arrivals. About 24 percent came to visit friends and relatives, 9 percent came for business and likewise 9 percent tourists, 7 percent for employment purposes, and 4 percent were transients bound for other destinations.

About 7,400 tourists visited American Samoa in 1994; an increase of 36 percent from the preceding year. More tourists came from New Zealand and Australia (53 percent) this year than from the United States (40 percent). About 5 percent came from Europe, and the remaining 5 percent came from elsewhere.

Western Samoa citizens accounted for about 41 percent of all arrivals in the territory. As expected, most Western Samoa citizens (54 percent) were here to visit relatives/friends and 25 percent were permanent residents of the territory returning from short visits abroad. Another 5 percent of Western Samoan arrivals were here for Business reasons and 13 percent were here for Employment.

Assuming that both arrival and departure totals are correct, then the expected net arrivals minus departures would be around +1,920. All Purposes of Travel categories gained in this calculation except the In-transit and Returning Residents categories which showed a net loss of -228 and -2,718.

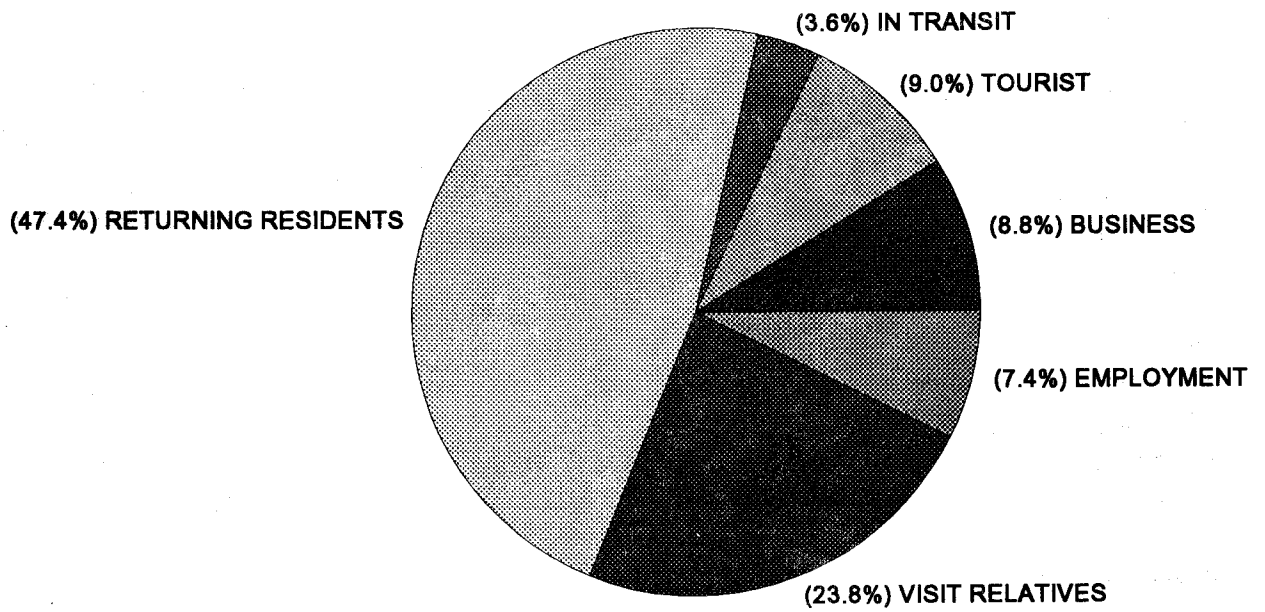

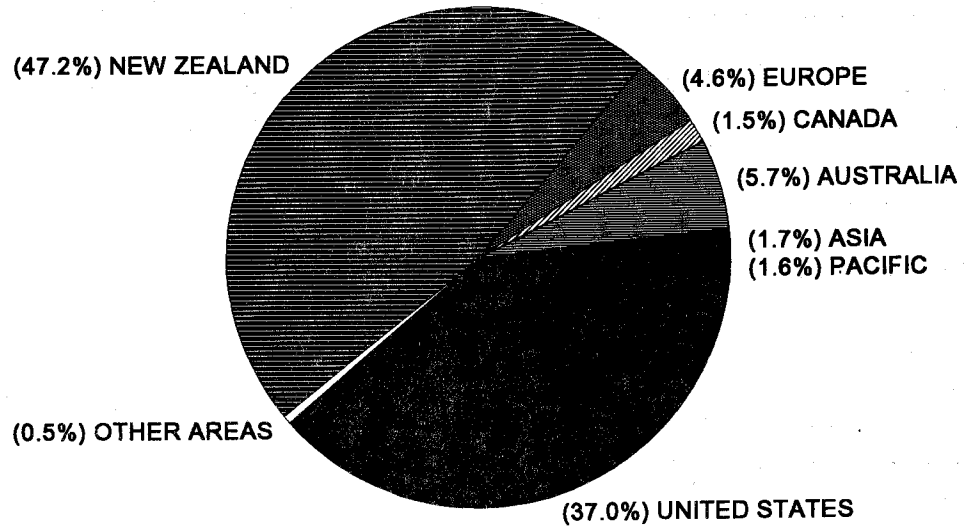

SECTION 8.

ELECTION

This section presents data on election statistics, voter registration, participation by voting districts, villages, age and sex of voters.

A new registration system with issuance of Voter Identification Card began in 1994.

A total of 11,138 persons registered with the new system for the General Election of November 1994. However, the 1992 Voter Listing of more than 15,000 was maintained without proper verification. About 92 percent of all registered voters in the new system actually voted in the 1994 election compared to about 80 percent in 1992. Of the 17 voting districts that went to poll in 1994, District #2, Manu'a had the largest voter turnout with 106 percent, while District #9, Ma'oputasi had the lowest with 88 percent. The reason for this high turn out of 106 percent was that those not registered in the new system were allowed to vote as long as they show their passports and birth certificates at the polling places. District #15, Tualauta, casts the most number of votes with 1,315, followed closely by District #12, Itu'au with 1,142 votes.

Of the total registered voters in the General Election of 1994, 53 percent were females, and about half were those aged 18 to 34 years. The legal age for voting in the Territory is 18 years.

VOTING REGISTRATION AND PARTICIPATION BY VOTING DISTRICT: 1994

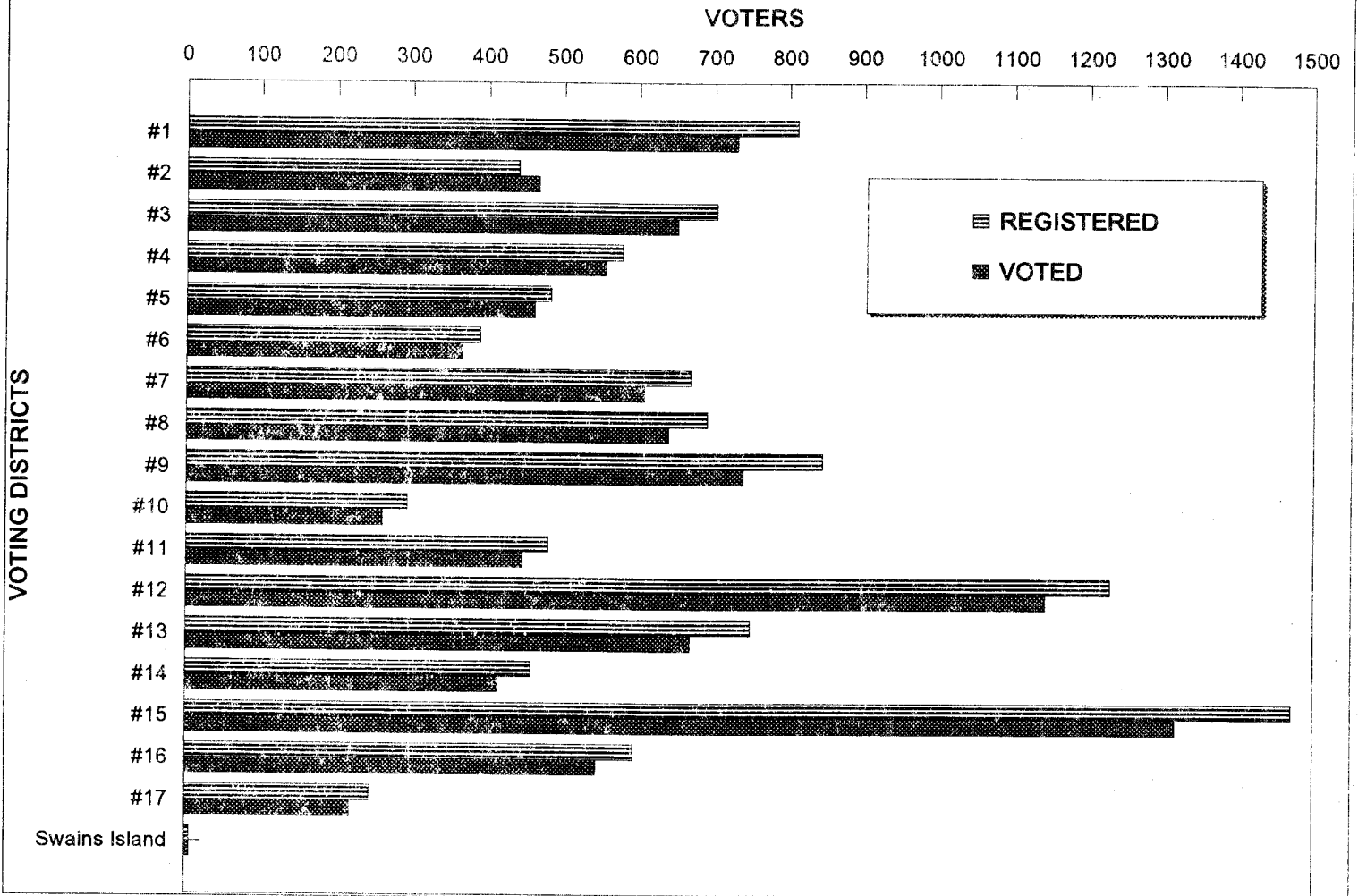

SECTION 9.

GOVERNMENT FINANCE

This section presents statistics relating to the American Samoa Government revenues and expenditures.

The American Samoa Government collected revenues totalling \$146.9 millions for the FY1992 and spent \$165.9 millions, resulting in a deficit of about \$19 millions at the end of FY1992. Total Grant revenues amounted to about 74 percent of all revenues, versus 25.6 percent of Local revenues. Local revenues decreased nearly 12 percent since FY1991, while Grant revenues took a sharp increase due to both FEMA Grant and other Federal Assistance. Total Federal revenues reported for FY1992 was 108 million; an increase of 100 percent compared to FY1991. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) recovery program funds amounted to approximately \$32 millions in FY1992. The Department of Interior (DOI) Operating Grant slightly increased by about 3 percent, compared yet to another slight increase of 4 percent for FY1990-FY1991. Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) grants rose sharply by more than 150 percent in FY1992.

About 64 percent of all Local revenues were tax collections, however, taxes have decreased by approximately 29 percent (nearly 10 millions). Charges for Government Services was the second largest source of local revenues with about \$6 millions.

Of the \$166.6 millions, the Government spent in FY1992, 45.7 percent was for General Government; 21 percent was allocated for Education and Culture while 16 percent was spent on Health and Welfare. The remaining amount was spent on Economic Development, Public Safety, Public Works, Parks & Recreation and Others. The per capita expenditure for all Government expenditures was \$3,260.

TOTAL REVENUES = \$146,905

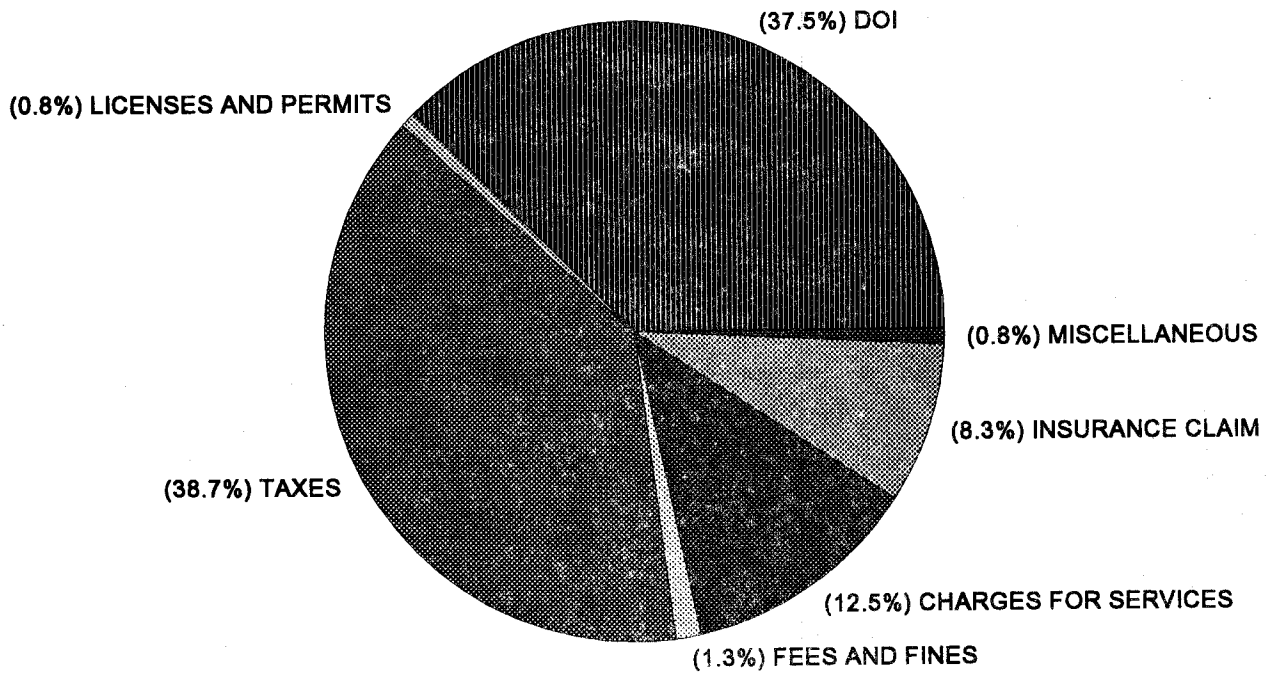

TOTAL EXPENDITURES: \$166.0 MILLIONS

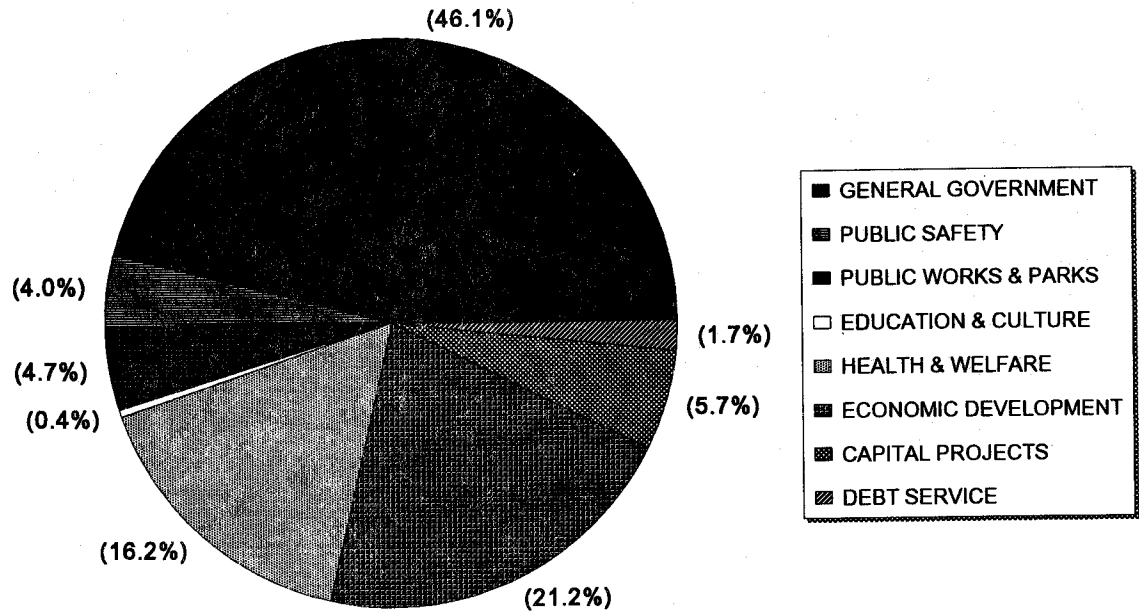

SECTION 10.

LABOR FORCE, EMPLOYMENT AND EARNINGS

This section presents statistics on labor force, wages, income and poverty.

The labor force for 1994 was estimated about 16,822; a decrease of about 3 percent from the preceding year. Of this total, 12,845 were employed and the remainder of 2,886 were potentially unemployed.

Local hired employees dominated the ASG workforce with about 79 percent, while contract workers and special programs accounted for 6.8 and 14.3 percent respectively. Employment at the canneries increase by 4 percent, an additional 135 jobs between 1993-1994. However, the Secondary sector (private sector) decrease by 15 percent.

From the 1990 Census, about 46 percent of the territorial workforce were born in Western Samoa versus 38 percent born in American Samoa. Only 6 percent were born in the United States and 4 percent Tongan born. About 34 percent of all workers were employed in Manufacturing industries followed by those in Professional and related service industries with about 18 percent. More than 30 percent of those employed were in Operator, fabricator, and laborer occupations. Those with Managerial and professional specialty occupations accounted for about 20 percent of workers. There were only 342 persons in Farming, forestry and fishing occupations.

The minimum wages for American Samoa under the Fair Labor Standards Act range from a high of \$3.50 an hour for Shipping & Transportation Classification A, to a low of \$2.25 an hour for Miscellaneous Activities. These rates became effective as of October 1, 1994. However, average hourly earnings were much higher which range from a high of \$5.61 an hour for Finance and Insurance to a low of \$3.14 an hour for Fish canning and processing workers. The median household income in 1989 was \$16,114 compared to the median income of \$9,718 in 1979. There were 745 households (11 percent) with income of less than \$5,000, while 478 households (7 percent) had income of \$50,000 or more. Most households were in the \$5,000 to \$15,000 income brackets. The median income for male aged 16 years and over in 1989 was \$7,151, while female was \$5,952. Of the 6,301 families, 3,563 (56 percent) were below the poverty level as determined by the U.S. Bureau of Census. More than 90 percent of families below poverty had children under 18 years of age.

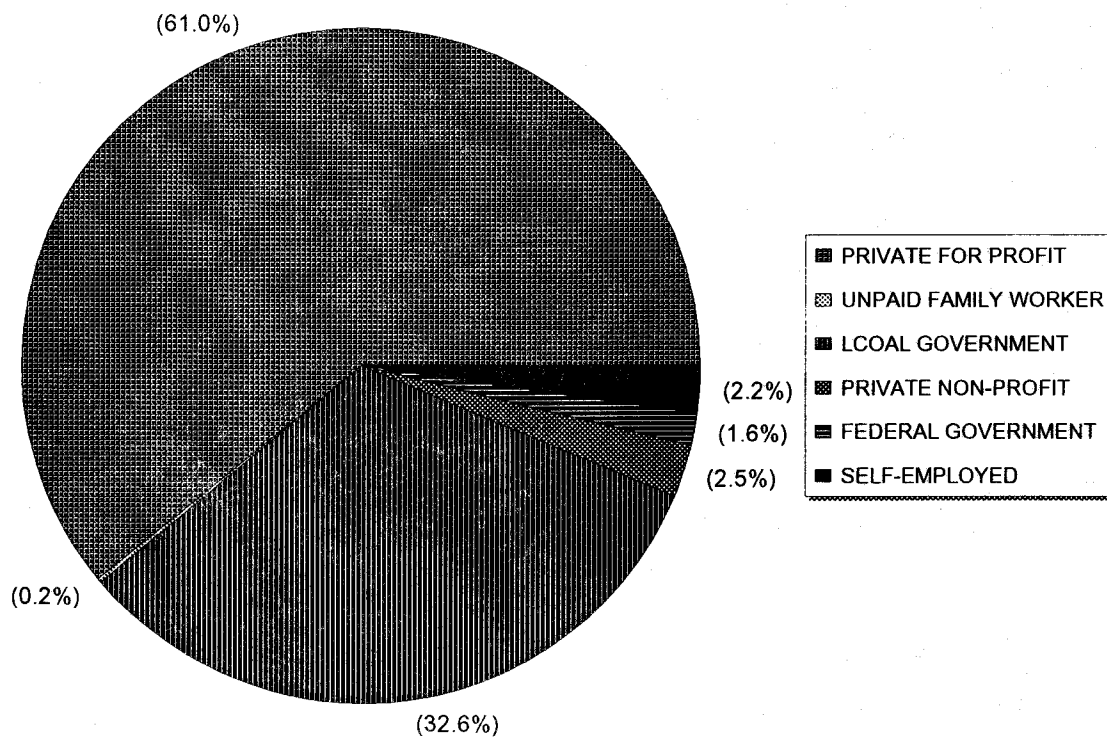

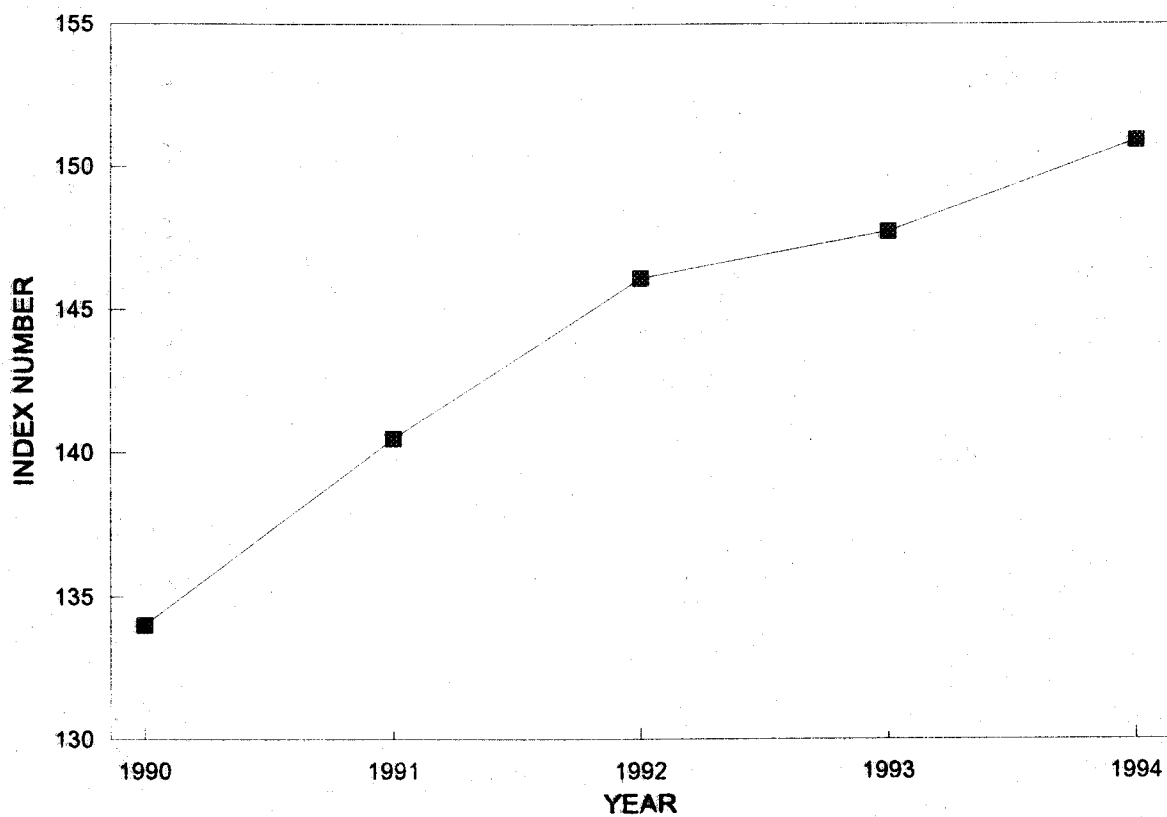

FY1990 TO FY1994

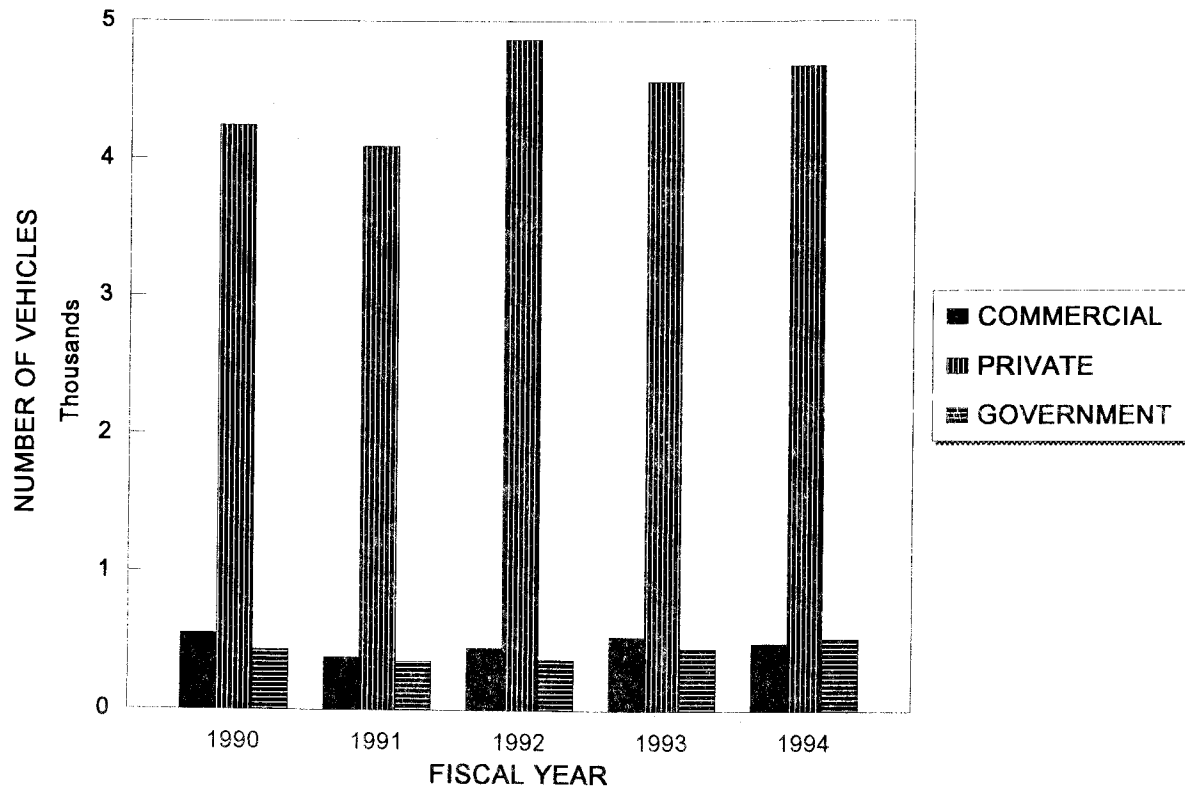

SECTION 13.

AGRICULTURE AND FISHING

This section presents statistics on agricultural land, farms, tenure, field crops, livestock and local fishing activities.

Farmers declined by about 15 percent between 1980 and 1990. However, the average size of a farm increased from 4.5 acres to 7.1 acres between the two censuses. About 88 percent of farms were for home consumption; the rest were commercial farms. Most farms were on the main island of Tutuila. The most common field crop harvested in 1989 was taro which were grown on 965 acres of land. There were 726 livestock farms and about 97 percent were hogs and pig farms.

Vegetables, taro and yams sold at the local market dropped substantially after major improvements in the agricultural sector since the hurricanes of 1990 and 1991. However, in 1994, the volume of taro sold at the market came down to almost nothing due to the taro plight disease which has affected taro farms both in American Samoa and Western Samoa. The loss in our main stable food is being replaced with higher yields of green bananas, giant taro, and breadfruits.

Improvements in the Local Fishing sector was seen this year. Over three hundred thousand pounds of fish were caught, (compared to only eighty four thousands in 1993) while the number of fishing boats and fishermen remained relatively the same. Trolling fishing method landed close to 80 percent of the total catch, followed by the bottom fishing method with over 10 percent.

SECTION 14

COMMERCE AND TRADE

This section presents data on trade activities (imports and exports), government purchases and business registration.

Total estimated imports into American Samoa in 1994 valued at \$497.8 million; an increase of about 6.7 percent since 1993. Both government foreign purchases and general imports of the commercial sector went up, whereas the estimated imports of raw fish by the canned manufacturing industries dropped this year. Government foreign purchases increased by almost 70 percent between 1993 and 1994, with a record high purchase worth over \$40 millions in the month of November 1993.

On the exports side, a total of \$252.2 million worth of exports was recorded. There is a drastic drop in total export between 1994 and 1993 resulting in an unfavorable trade balance or deficit of \$245.6 millions. However, the 1994 data is preliminary pending further investigation to the significant drop in total export.

While the United States still leads in terms of total imports, imports from New Zealand have gone up in the past five years. In 1990, imports from this country totaled \$12 millions, whereas in 1994, it went up to almost \$20 millions. On the hand, imports from Australia and Fiji have dropped dramatically in the same period. With the current listing of selected imports, 22 percent were food and beverages and 17 percent were petroleum products. Tin Plates now leads the import commodity listings with about \$41 millions, followed by Diesel Fuel with \$26 millions.

Registered businesses dropped from 2,275 to 2,188 in 1994. This drop is attributed to the decline in number of Construction businesses, Transportation and Public Utilities, Wholesale Trade, Finance-Insurance-Real Estates and Services. The most significant drop in terms of absolute numbers was seen in Service Industries followed by Wholesale Industries.

SECTION 15

ELECTRICITY AND WATER

This section presents statistics on electricity production, consumption, sales, number of electric meters and water use.

Gross electricity produced in 1994 totaled 125 million kwhs; an increase of about 2.5 percent from the 1993 production. Over 8 million gallons of fuel was consumed in producing the 125 million kwhs, giving a favorable fuel efficiency ratio of 15.2 (the highest in the last five years). On the other hand, the lube oil efficiency ratio has dropped significantly since 1992. The percentage of line loss also dropped this year to 11.3 percent (the lowest in the last five years), indicating improvements in distribution lines and physical makeup of power supply. However, internal power usage at the Power Stations has gone up by over 50 percent in 1994 (over 5 million kwhs was consumed out of the 125 million kwhs produced).

The demand for electricity in the last five years is overwhelming, suggesting substantial improvements after the two hurricanes. Over 85 percent of the net 120 million kwhs available were sold, and the sales trend increased by over 20 percent since 1990 or about 5 percent annually. Likewise, the number of meters in 1994 went by 2.4 percent. Although there was a slight drop in the number of Residential meters, Commercial Large Power Users and Government meters all went up this year. The highest increase in the number of meters was the American Samoa Power Authority itself with a more than 50 percent increase.

Water meters increased by almost 2 percent as more and more homes were connected to the Government Water System. In the census of 1990, close to 60 percent of housing units in American Samoa were now connected to the Public System (government water system). Another 32 percent were still depending on Village Water Systems.
