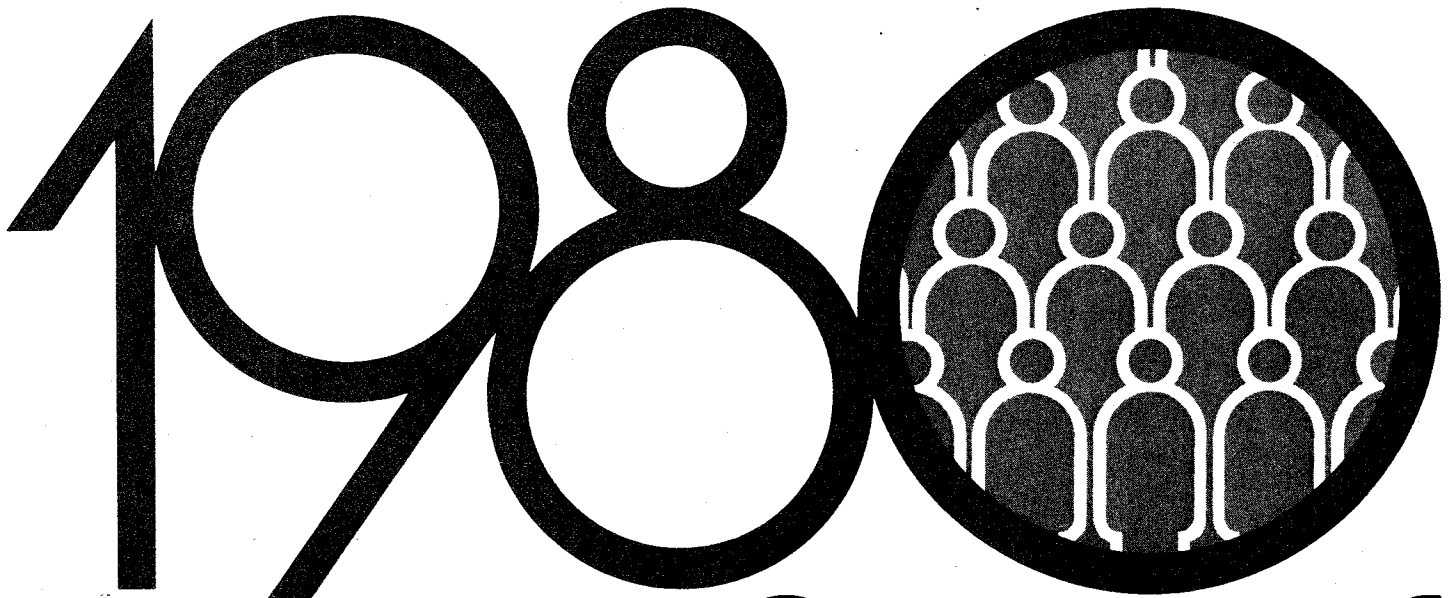

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GENERAL

This report presents data from the 1980 Census of Population on basic demographic characteristics of the inhabitants of the Area, its subdivisions, places, and certain other geographic areas (e.g., urban and rural portions of the Area). The abbreviated identification for this report is PC80-1-B (i.e., Population Census, 1980-Volume 1-Chapter B) followed by a number representing the Area. Legal provision for this census, which was conducted as of April 1, 1980 (September 15, 1980 for the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, excluding the Northern Mariana Islands), was made in the Act of Congress of August 31, 1954 (amended August 1957, December 1975, and October 1976), which codified Title 13, United States Code.

A large portion of the information compiled from the 1980 Census of Population will appear in Volume 1, *Characteristics of the Population*, of which this report is part.

For the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, and American Samoa, the 1980 census figures presented may differ from those shown in the *Advance Reports*, PHC80-V. In the case of the Northern Mariana Islands and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, the figures may differ from those shown in the Press Releases with final counts. The changes reflect corrections of errors found after the PHC80-V reports and press releases were prepared. The changes may affect any geographic area shown in this report.

The content and procedures of the 1980 census were determined after evaluation of the results of the 1970 census and consultation with a wide variety of users of census data. A number of changes were introduced in 1980 to improve the usefulness of the census results. The changes, however, do not affect to any appreciable extent the comparability between the 1980 and the 1970 data. Further information on comparability appears in Appendix B, "Definitions and Explanations of Subject Characteristics."

More detailed information on the technical and procedural matters covered in the text of this report can be obtained by writing to the Director, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233. Such information will also appear in other publications of the 1980 census.

CONTENTS OF THE REPORT

This report contains a text (this introduction and five appendixes), a table of contents, maps, detailed tables and 4 tables covering substitutions and allocations (see Appendix D, "Accuracy of the Data"). Each table is identified by a table number and title. The "stubhead" at the left under the title defines the types of geographic areas for which data are shown in the particular table and is considered part of the table title.

The first table in this report is table 14; tables 1 to 13 appear in the *Number of Inhabitants*, PC80-1-A report for this Area. Data are presented in this report on age, sex, relationship to householder, and marital status. Data on race and Spanish origin are also presented for the Virgin Islands of the United States. The tables are followed by a map section which includes:

- A map legend for the administrative district subdivision map.

- A one-page administrative district subdivision map that shows the names and boundaries of municipalities, municipal districts, and places, as recognized by the Census Bureau.

The appendixes appear last in the report. Appendix A describes the various area classifications (e.g., urban and rural residence, minor civil divisions, and places). Appendix B provides definitions and explanations for the subjects covered in this report. Appendix C explains the residence rules used in counting the population and describes the data collection and processing procedures. Appendix D presents information on the sources of error in the data, editing procedures, and a description of allocation and substitution tables B-1 to B-4. Appendix E contains facsimiles of the 1980 census questionnaire pages showing the population questions from which the data in this report were derived.

SYMBOLS AND GEOGRAPHIC ABBREVIATIONS

The following symbols and geographic abbreviations are used in the tables:

- A dash "-" represents zero or a percent which rounds to less than 0.1.
- Three dots "..." mean not applicable, or that the data are being withheld to avoid disclosure of information for individuals. (For further information on disclosure, see the section below on "Suppression of Data for Confidentiality.")
- (NA) means not available.
- A minus sign preceding a figure denotes decrease.
- CDP is census designated place.
- (unorg.) is unorganized territory.

SUPPRESSION OF DATA FOR CONFIDENTIALITY

In order to maintain the confidentiality promised respondents and required by law, the Bureau of the Census takes precautions to make sure that its published data do not disclose information about particular individuals and housing units. To accomplish this, the Census Bureau suppresses data for characteristics which are based on a small number of persons and/or housing units in the geographic area. Under certain conditions both primary and complementary suppression may take place.

The general rules of primary suppression are: counts of total persons are never

suppressed; characteristics for persons are shown only if there are 15 or more persons in the geographic area; counts of total housing units, vacant housing units, year-round housing units, and occupied housing units are never suppressed; characteristics of year-round housing units which are not classified by occupancy status are shown only when there are five or more year-round housing units in the geographic area; characteristics of families, households, or occupied housing units are shown only if there are at least five occupied housing units within the geographic area; and distributions of data for owners or renters are shown only where the number of owners is at least five or the number of renters is also at

least five. These primary suppression criteria are applied independently of one another.

For the Virgin Islands of the United States, counts of total population by race and Spanish origin are never suppressed. Population and occupied housing unit characteristics cross-classified by race or Spanish origin (of the householder in the case of occupied housing units) are subject to an additional level of scrutiny. This level requires that the 15-person or the 5-housing unit criteria stated above be applied individually to each race or Spanish origin category.

Finally, complementary suppression is applied to prevent the derivation of primary suppressed data by subtraction.

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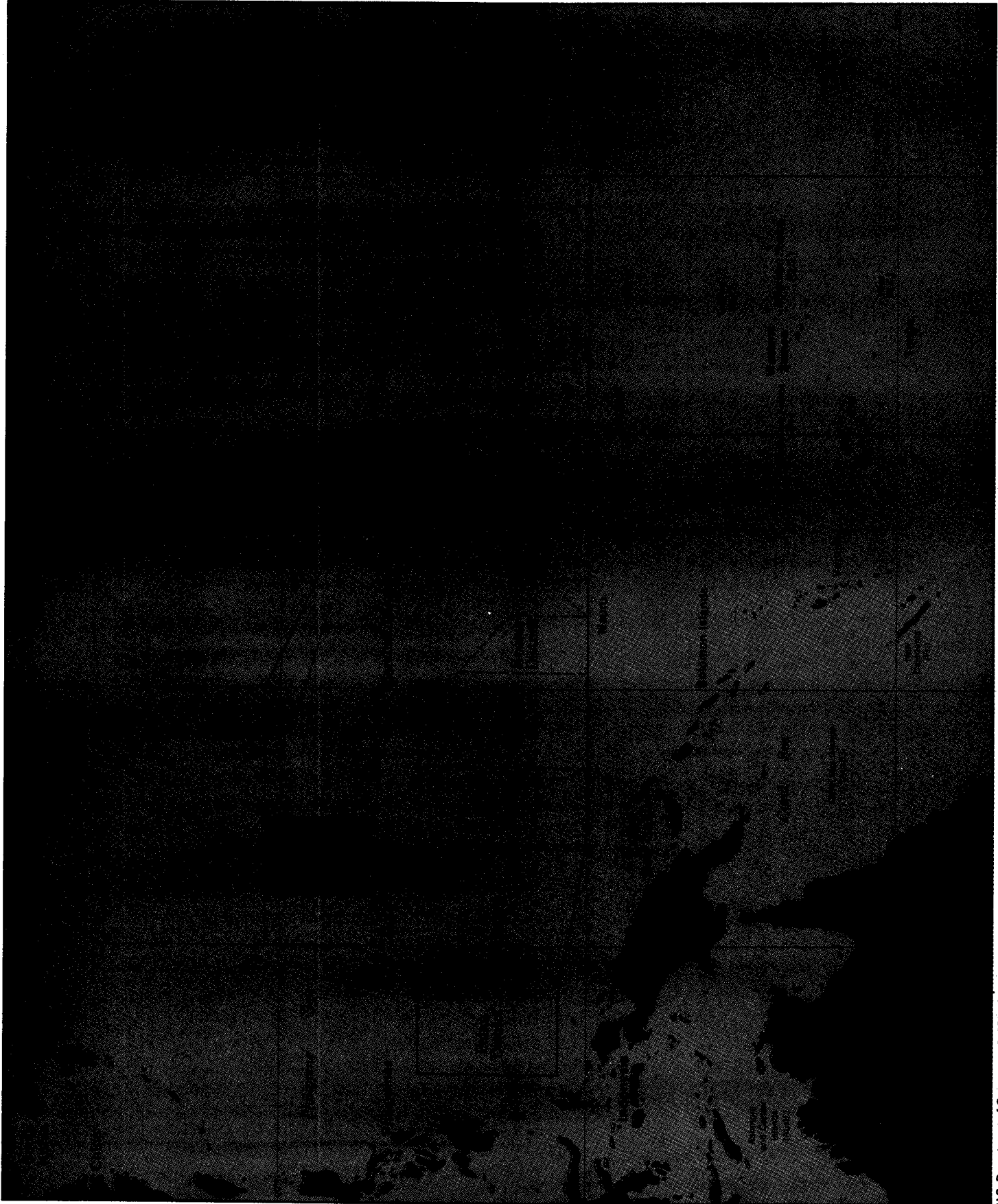
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Northern Mariana Islands and the Pacific Area

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Northern Mariana Islands, Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands

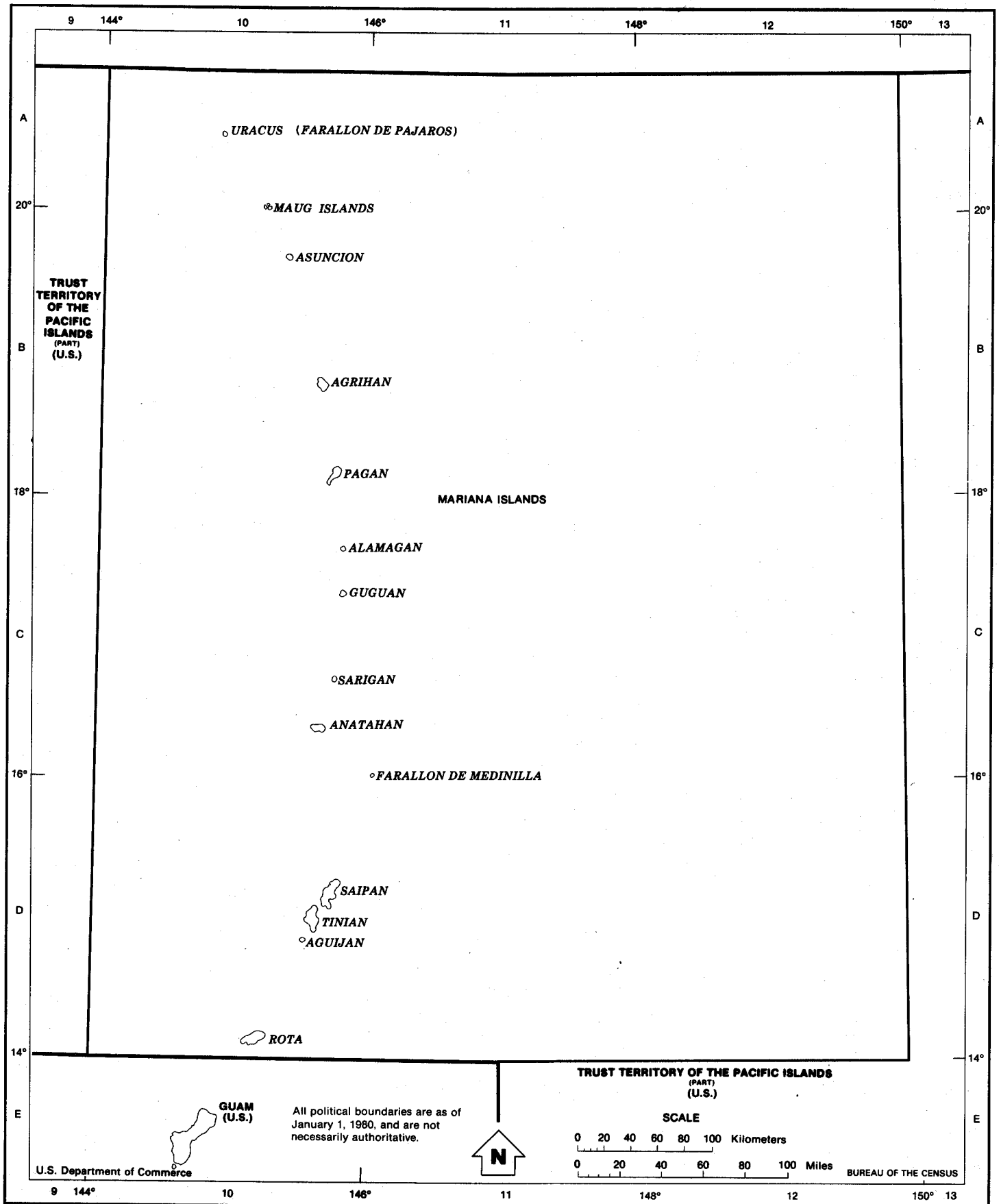

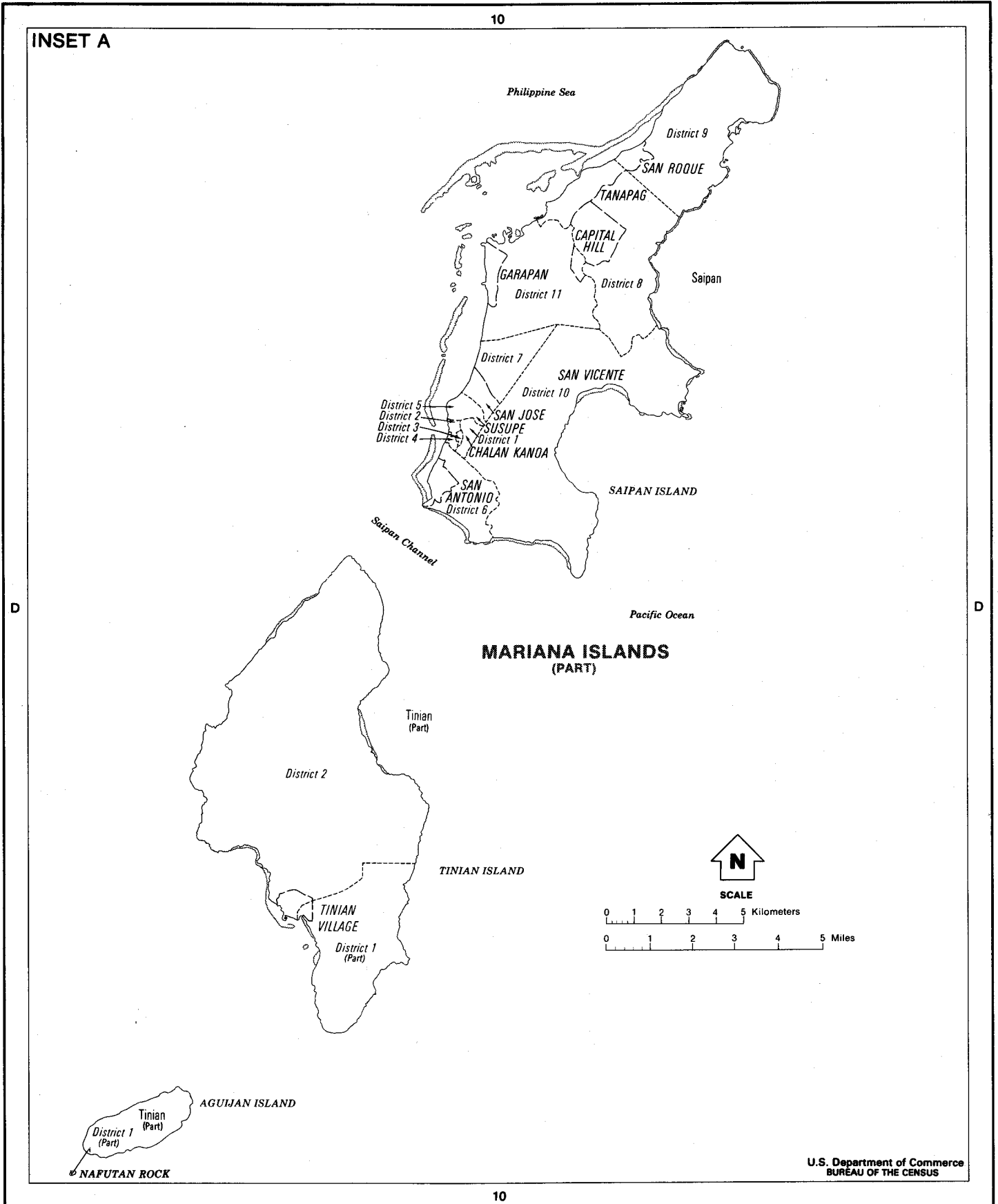

STATE EQUIVALENTS

The 50 States and the District of Columbia are the constituent units of the United States. Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands are treated as State equivalents in the text and tables of the PC80-1-B reports.

COUNTY EQUIVALENTS

In most States, the primary divisions are termed counties. In the Virgin Islands of the United States, the comparable areas are the three major islands. In American Samoa, the county equivalents are three districts and two islands. Since there are no primary divisions in Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands, the entire area of each is considered equivalent to a county for census purposes. In the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, excluding the Northern Mariana Islands, the administrative districts are the county equivalents.

COUNTY SUBDIVISION EQUIVALENTS

In reports for the States, statistics are presented for the following subdivisions

of counties or equivalent areas: minor civil divisions (MCD's), census county divisions (CCD's), and, in Alaska, census subareas. In the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, statistics are presented for minor civil divisions.

In the States, MCD's are primary divisions which were established under State law. MCD's in the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, have been established by local law.

In the Virgin Islands of the United States, MCD's called census subdistricts have been established for the 1980 census to replace the quarters and cities that were used in the 1970 census. The MCD's in Guam are referred to as election districts. For American Samoa, the three districts are subdivided into MCD's called counties; MCD's for the two islands coincide with and have the same names as these islands. The MCD's in the Northern Mariana Islands are called municipalities.

The MCD's in the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands are municipalities. In addition, the Census Bureau recognizes two islands and one unorganized territory that are not within any municipality. In the Palau District of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, numerous islands are not included in a legally established MCD (municipality); this area of unorganized territory is recognized as one subdivision and given a name (Palau Islands) by the Census Bureau, followed by the designation "(unorg.)."

PLACES

Two types of places are recognized in the State census reports—incorporated places

and census designated places—as defined below.

Incorporated Places

Incorporated places recognized in the State census reports are those which are incorporated under the laws of their respective States as cities, boroughs, towns, and villages. There are no incorporated places in the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

Towns in the Virgin Islands of the United States and villages in American Samoa are not legally incorporated. The three places specified as towns in the Virgin Islands Code have legally established boundaries and purposes, but are not functioning governments. The villages in American Samoa have functioning governments authorized by the Revised Code of American Samoa, but do not have legally established boundaries.

Census Designated Places

As in previous censuses, the Census Bureau, in cooperation with local governments, delineated boundaries for closely settled population centers without corporate limits. In 1980, the name of each such place is followed by "(CDP)," meaning "census designated place." Six CDP's have been designated in the Virgin Islands of the United States. For 1980, all places in Guam are designated as CDP's; in 1970 and earlier censuses, these places were erroneously identified in publications as cities, towns, and villages. All places in the Northern Mariana Islands and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands are CDP's. To be recognized for the 1980 census, CDP's in the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands,

and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands must have a minimum 1980 population of 300. There are no CDP'S in American Samoa.

Census designated place boundaries change as the settlement pattern changes; a place which has the same name as in previous censuses does not necessarily have the same boundaries. Boundary outlines for CDP's are shown on the map which follows the tables. Larger-scale maps, showing boundaries in more detail, are available for purchase from the Census Bureau.

URBAN AND RURAL RESIDENCE

The urban population consists of all persons living in places of 2,500 or more inhabitants. The population not classified as urban constitutes the rural population.

BOUNDARY CHANGES

The boundaries of some of the areas shown in this report have changed be-

tween earlier censuses and January 1, 1980. Information on boundary changes is presented in table 4 of the PC80-1-A reports. For information on boundary changes prior to 1970 for the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, and American Samoa, see the *Number of Inhabitants* reports for previous censuses.

AREA MEASUREMENTS

Area measurement figures for county equivalents are available in table 2 of the PC80-1-A report for each Area.

Appendix B.—Definitions and Explanations of Subject Characteristics

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GENERAL

The 1980 census of the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands was conducted through direct interview. Enumerators visited and listed every housing unit, asking the questions as worded in the questionnaire and recording the answers. Responses were determined by the questionnaire and the instructions given to the enumerator. The definitions and explanations given below for each subject are drawn largely from various technical materials and procedures used in the data collection. Explanatory information is included to assist the user in the proper use of the statistics.

Facsimiles of the questionnaire pages containing the population questions used to produce the data shown in this report are presented in Appendix E. The subjects are listed below in the order in which they appear on the census questionnaire.

HOUSEHOLD, RELATIONSHIP TO HOUSEHOLDER, FAMILY, AND GROUP QUARTERS

Household

A household includes all the persons who occupy a housing unit. A housing unit is a house, an apartment, a group of rooms, or a single room occupied as a separate living quarters, or if vacant, intended for occupancy as a separate living quarters. Separate living quarters are those in which the occupants live and eat separately from other persons in the building and have direct access from the outside of the building or through a common hall. The occupants may be a single family, one person living alone, two or more families living together, or any other group of related or unrelated persons who share living arrangements.

Because of the living arrangements among extended families in certain sections of American Samoa, additional instructions were provided to help enumerators determine whether a living quarters met the housing unit definition. Extended families make use of two different types of living arrangements. One type has a common kitchen surrounded by several fale (structures) where the members of the extended family sleep. The meals are prepared in the cooking fale used by all members of the extended family. The family members either eat their meals at their own fale or together at one fale. In this arrangement, each individual fale is treated as a room within one housing unit. The other type of living arrangement has separate cooking facilities in each fale, but the family members share a common outdoor umu (oven). The family members pick up the cooked food from the umu and finish preparing

and eating their meals at their individual fale. Since each fale has its own cooking facility, it is considered a separate housing unit. Guest houses are counted as a room in the housing unit of a matai (a chief), not as a separate housing unit as was done in 1970.

The actual classification of a housing unit as a household depends on entries in question 2 and item B on the census questionnaire. Item B on type of unit or quarters was filled by an enumerator or a census office clerk for each housing unit or group quarters.

The measure "persons per household" is obtained by dividing the number of persons in households by the number of households (or householders).

Relationship to Householder

The data on relationship to householder were obtained from answers to question 2, which was asked of all persons in housing units. Five basic categories of relationship are recognized in most tables of this report. More detailed categories of relationship will appear in the PC80-1-C and the PC80-1-D reports.

Householder—One person in each household is designated as the "householder." In most cases, this is the person, or one of the persons, in whose name the home is owned or rented or is associated with and who is listed in column 1 of the census questionnaire. If there is no such person in the household, any adult household member could be designated as the "householder."

Two types of householders are distinguished—a family householder and a non-family householder. A family householder lives with one or more persons related to him or her by birth, marriage,

or adoption. The householder and all persons in the household related to him or her are family members. A nonfamily householder lives alone or with non-relatives only.

Spouse—A person married to and living with a householder. This category includes persons in formal marriages as well as persons consensually married. The number of spouses is equal to the number of "married-couple families."

Child—A son, daughter, stepchild, or adopted child of the householder regardless of the child's age or marital status. The category excludes sons-in-law and daughters-in-law. In this report, those classified as "own child of householder" are sons and daughters, including step-children and adopted children of the householder who are single (never married) and under 18 years of age.

Other Relative—Any person related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption, who is not shown separately in the particular table (e.g., "spouse," "child," "brother or sister," or "parent").

Nonrelative—Any person in the household not related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. Roomers, boarders, roommates, paid employees, wards, and foster children are included in this category.

When relationship is not reported for an individual, it is allocated according to the responses for age and marital status for that person while maintaining consistency with responses for other individuals in the household. The allocation procedure is described in Appendix D, "Accuracy of the Data."

Family

A family consists of a householder and one or more other persons living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption; all persons in a household who are related to the householder are regarded as members of his or her family. A "married-couple family" is a family in which the householder and spouse are enumerated as members of the same household. Not all households contain families, because a household may be composed of a group of unrelated persons or one person living alone. The measure

"persons per family" is obtained by dividing the total number of persons in families by the total number of families (or family householders).

Group Quarters

All persons not living in households are classified by the Bureau of the Census as living in group quarters. Two general categories of persons in group quarters are recognized:

Inmate of Institution—Persons under care or custody in institutions at the time of enumeration are classified as "patients or inmates" of an institution regardless of their length of stay in that place and regardless of the number of people in that place. Institutions include homes, schools, hospitals, or wards for the physically or mentally handicapped; hospitals or wards for mental, tubercular, or chronic disease patients; homes for unmarried mothers; nursing, convalescent, and rest homes for the aged and dependent; orphanages; and correctional institutions.

Other—This category includes all persons living in group quarters who are not inmates of institutions. Rooming and boarding houses, convents or monasteries, and other living quarters are classified as "other" group quarters if there are 9 or more persons unrelated to the person listed in column 1 of the census questionnaire; or if 10 or more unrelated persons share the unit. Persons residing in certain other types of living arrangements are classified as living in "other" group quarters regardless of the number or relationship of people in the unit. These include persons residing in military barracks, on ships, or in college dormitories; patients in general or maternity wards of hospitals who have no usual residence elsewhere; staff members in institutional quarters; and persons enumerated in missions, flophouses, etc.

Comparability With 1970 Census Data—

Other than in American Samoa, the definition of a housing unit was the same in 1980 as in 1970 except that in 1980 there was no requirement that there be cooking facilities for exclusive use of the household. In American Samoa, a fale (a structure) was considered a housing unit if it had individual cooking facilities; otherwise, it was considered a room.

The household reference person in 1970 was the "head of household" (the

husband in married-couple families); for 1980 it was changed to "the household member (or one of the members) in whose name the house is owned or rented or is associated with." In 1970, a unit in which 6 or more unrelated persons were living together was classified as group quarters; for 1980 that requirement was raised to 10 or more unrelated persons.

SEX

The data on sex were derived from answers to question 3. At the time of field review, most cases in which sex was not reported were resolved by determining the appropriate entry from the person's given name and household relationship. In processing, if sex still had not been determined it was allocated according to the relationship to householder and the age and marital status of the person. The allocation process is described in Appendix D, "Accuracy of the Data."

RACE (Virgin Islands of the United States Only)

The data on race were derived from answers to question 4. The concept of race as used by the Census Bureau reflects self-identification by respondents; it does not denote any clear-cut scientific definition of biological stock. Since the 1980 census obtained information on race through self-identification, the data represent self-classification by people according to the race with which they identify. This is a modification of the 1970 census procedures in which race was obtained in most cases by the enumerator's observation. In this report, households and families are classified by the race of the householder.

For persons who could not provide a single response to the race question, the race of the person's mother was used; however, if a single response could not be provided for the person's mother, the first race reported by the person was used.

The category "Black" includes persons who indicated their race as Black or Negro, as well as persons who did not classify themselves in one of the specific race categories listed on the questionnaire but reported entries such as Jamaican,

Black Puerto Rican, West Indian, Haitian, or Nigerian.

The category "White" includes persons who indicated their race as White, as well as persons who did not classify themselves in one of the specific race categories listed on the questionnaire but entered a response such as Canadian, German, Italian, Lebanese, or Polish. In the 1980 census, persons who did not classify themselves in one of the specific race categories but marked "Other" and wrote in entries such as Cuban, Puerto Rican, Mexican, or Dominican were included in the "Other" race category.

The category "Other" includes all races other than Black or White.

If the race entry was missing on the questionnaire for a member of a household, an answer was assigned by the computer according to the reported entries of race of other household members using specific rules of precedence of household relationship. If race was not entered for anyone in the household (excluding paid employees), the race of a householder in a previously processed household was assigned. This procedure is a variation of the general allocation process described in Appendix D, "Accuracy of the Data."

AGE

The data on age were derived from answers to question 5. Only the information in questions 5b and 5c (on month and year of birth) was read into the computer. Answers to question 5a (on age at last birthday) were not read by FOSDIC, but were used during field review to fill any blanks in question 5c. The age classification is based on the age of the person in completed years as determined by the difference between date of birth and April 1, 1980 (September 15, 1980 for the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, excluding the Northern Mariana Islands).

The median ages shown in this report for 1980 were computed from data for single years of age. If the median fell in the terminal category of an age distribution, the method of presentation was to

show the initial age of the terminal category followed by a plus sign; thus, if the median fell in the category "75 years and over," it is shown as "75+."

In each census since 1950, the Bureau of the Census has assigned the age of a person when it was not reported. In censuses before 1950, persons of unknown age were shown as a separate category. In 1960, 1970, and 1980, assignment of unknown ages was performed by the allocation procedure described in Appendix D, "Accuracy of the Data."

FERTILITY RATIO

The fertility ratio shown in table 14 is the number of children under 5 years old per 1,000 women 15 to 49 years old.

MARITAL STATUS

The data on marital status were derived from answers to question 6.

The marital status classification refers to the status at the time of enumeration. Persons classified as "now married" include those who have been married only once and have never been widowed or divorced and those currently married persons who remarried after having been widowed or divorced. Consensually married persons are those living in a marital union without a civil or religious matrimonial contract and are included with those classified as now married; they are reported separately as "consensually married." Persons reported as "separated" are those living apart because of marital discord, with or without a legal separation. Persons whose only marriage had been annulled, and all persons under 15 years old are classified as "never married." All persons classified as "never married" are shown as "single" in this report.

When marital status was not reported, it was allocated according to the relationship to householder and sex and age of the person. The allocation process is described in Appendix D, "Accuracy of the Data."

SPANISH/HISPANIC ORIGIN (Virgin Islands of the United States Only)

The data on Spanish/Hispanic origin or descent were derived from answers to question 7. This question was asked in the Virgin Islands of the United States for the first time in 1980.

Persons of Spanish origin or descent are those who classified themselves in one of the specific Spanish origin categories listed on the questionnaire—Puerto Rican or Cuban—as well as those who indicated that they were of other Spanish/Hispanic origin. Persons reporting "other Spanish/Hispanic" origin are those whose origins are from Spain, Mexico, or the Spanish-speaking countries of Central or South America, or they are Spanish origin persons identifying themselves generally as Spanish, Spanish American, Hispano, Latino, etc. Origin or descent can be viewed as the ancestry, nationality group, lineage, or country in which the person or person's parents or ancestors were born. Persons of Spanish origin may be of any race. In this report, households and families are classified by the Spanish origin of the householder.

Persons of more than one Spanish origin and persons of both a Spanish and another origin who did not report a specific origin were classified according to the origin of the person's mother. If a single origin was not provided for the person's mother, the first reported origin of the person was used.

If any household member failed to respond to the Spanish/Hispanic origin question, a response was assigned by computer according to the reported entries of other household members by using specific rules of precedence of household relationship. If origin was not entered for any household member (excluding a paid employee), origin was assigned from another household according to the race of the householder. This procedure is a variation of the general allocation process described in Appendix D, "Accuracy of the Data."

USUAL PLACE OF RESIDENCE

In accordance with census practice, each person enumerated in the 1980 census was counted as an inhabitant of his or her "usual place of residence," which is generally construed to mean the place where the person lives and sleeps most of the time. This place is not necessarily the same as the person's legal residence or voting residence. In the vast majority of cases, however, the use of these different bases of classification would produce substantially the same statistics, although there might be appreciable differences for a few areas.

The implementation of this practice has resulted in the establishment of residence rules for certain categories of persons whose usual place of residence is not immediately apparent. Furthermore, this practice means that persons were not always counted as residents of the place where they happened to be staying on Census Day. Persons without a usual place of residence, or persons with no one at their usual place of residence to report them to a census taker, however, were counted where they happened to be staying.

U.S. Armed Forces

Members of the U.S. Armed Forces living on a military installation were counted, as

in previous censuses, as residents of the area in which the installation was located; members of the U.S. Armed Forces not living on a military installation were counted as residents of the area in which they were living. Persons in families with U.S. Armed Forces personnel were counted where they were living on Census Day (i.e., the military installation or "off base," as the case might be).

Each U.S. Navy ship was attributed to the geographic area that the Department of the Navy designated as its homeport.

Crews of Merchant Vessels

Crews of merchant ships berthed in a port, excluding those not flying a U.S. flag, were enumerated as of that port.

Persons Away at School

College students were counted as residents of the area in which they were living while attending college. However, children in boarding schools below the college level were counted at their parental home.

Persons in Institutions

Inmates of institutions were counted as residents of the area where the institution was located. Patients in short-term wards of general hospitals were counted at their usual place of residence; if they had no usual place of residence or there was no one at their usual place of residence to report them, they were counted at the hospital.

Persons Away From Their Residence on Census Day

Persons in hotels, motels, etc., on the night of March 31, 1980 (September 12, 1980 for the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, excluding the Northern

Mariana Islands), having their usual home within the area and who indicated that no one was at home to report them in the census, were enumerated as residents of the hotel, motel, etc. Information on persons away from their usual place of residence who indicated that someone was at home to report them was obtained from other members of their families, resident managers, neighbors, etc. If an entire household was away during the whole period of the enumeration, information on that household was obtained from neighbors.

In the Virgin Islands of the United States, the part of the procedures relating to the enumeration of persons staying in hotels and motels was not feasible because of the large number of guests in the islands during the local festivities that took place around Census Day. This should not have any significant effect on the total population counts, since persons staying at hotels and motels during this period were generally not residents of the Area, and even if they were, someone at home would have reported them to a census taker.

Residents Abroad

Residents who were abroad for an extended period (in the U.S. Armed Forces, working at civilian jobs, studying in universities outside the Area, etc.) were not included in the population of the Area. On the other hand, residents who were temporarily abroad on vacations, business trips, and the like, were counted at their usual residence in the Area.

Persons from Other Areas

Persons from other areas, having their usual residence (legally or illegally) in this Area on Census Day, including those working here and those attending school (but not living at a chancellery or consulate), were included in the enumeration,

as were members of their families living with them, regardless of citizenship. However, persons from other areas, temporarily visiting or traveling in this Area, were not enumerated in the 1980 census.

DATA COLLECTION PROCEDURES

The 1980 census of the Virgin Islands of the United States, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands was conducted through direct interview. Beginning on Census Day, April 1, 1980 (September 15, 1980 for the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, excluding the Northern Mariana Islands), enumerators visited and listed every household asking the questions as worded on the questionnaire, and recording the answers. A single questionnaire

was used, which contained all the questions asked of every person and household.

Special questionnaires were used for the enumeration of persons in group quarters such as colleges and universities, hospitals, and prisons. These forms contained the same population questions that appeared on the regular census questionnaire but did not include any housing questions.

PROCESSING PROCEDURES

The 1980 census questionnaires were processed in a manner similar to that for the 1970 census. They were designed to be processed electronically by the Film Optical Sensing Device for Input into Computer (FOSDIC). For most items on the questionnaire, the information obtained by the enumerator was recorded by marking the answers in the predesig-

nated positions that would be "read" by FOSDIC from a microfilm copy of the questionnaire and transferred onto computer tape with no intervening manual processing. The computer tape excluded information on individual names and addresses.

The tape containing the information from the questionnaires was processed on the Census Bureau's computers through a number of editing and tabulating steps. Among the products of this operation were computer tapes from which the tables in this report (and most others in the 1980 census publications) were prepared on phototypesetting equipment at the Government Printing Office.

A more detailed description of the data collection and processing procedures can be obtained from the 1980 Census of Population and Housing, *Users' Guide*, PHC80-R1.

SOURCES OF ERROR

Since the 1980 population data shown in this report were tabulated from the entries for persons on all questionnaires, these data are not subject to sampling error. In any large-scale statistical operation such as a decennial census, human and mechanical errors occur. These errors are commonly referred to as nonsampling errors. Such errors include failure to enumerate every housing unit or person in the population, not obtaining all required information from respondents, obtaining incorrect or inconsistent information, and recording information incorrectly. Errors can also occur during the field review of the enumerators' work, the clerical handling of the census questionnaires, or the electronic processing of the questionnaires.

In an attempt to reduce various types of nonsampling error in the 1980 census, a number of techniques were introduced on the basis of experience in previous censuses and in tests conducted prior to the census. These quality control and review measures were used throughout the data collection and processing phases of the census to minimize undercoverage of the population and housing units and to keep the errors at a minimum.

EDITING OF UNACCEPTABLE DATA

The objective of the processing operation is to produce a set of statistics that de-

scribes the population as accurately and clearly as possible. To meet this objective, certain unacceptable entries were edited.

In the field, questionnaires were reviewed for omissions and certain inconsistencies by a census clerk or an enumerator and, if necessary, a followup was made to obtain missing information. In addition, a similar review of questionnaires was done in the central processing office. As a rule, however, editing was performed by hand only when it could not be done effectively by machine.

There are two means by which incomplete or inconsistent data on the questionnaires were corrected during the editing process: allocation and substitution. Allocations or assignments of acceptable codes in place of unacceptable entries, were needed most often when there was no entry for a given item or when the information reported for a person on that item was inconsistent with other information for the person. As in previous censuses, the general procedure for changing unacceptable entries was to assign an entry for a person that was consistent with entries for other persons with similar characteristics. The assignment of acceptable codes in place of blanks or unacceptable entries enhances the usefulness of the data. The allocation technique may be illustrated by the procedure used in the assignment of unknown age. The allocation of this item was carried out in the following steps:

1. The computer stored reported ages of persons by selected characteristics, including sex, relationship, marital status, and characteristics of other household members.
2. Each stored age entry was retained in the computer only until a succeeding person having the same set of characteristics and having age reported was processed through the computer

during the electronic edit operation. Then the reported age entry of the succeeding person was stored in place of the one previously stored.

3. When the age of a person was not reported, or the entry was unacceptable, the age assigned to this person was that which was stored for the last person who otherwise had the same set of characteristics.

This process insured that the distribution of ages assigned by the computer for persons with a given set of characteristics would correspond closely to the age distribution of persons who had actually reported age in the census.

A second way in which corrections were made during the editing process was through substitution, that is the assignment of a full set of characteristics for a person. When there was an indication that a housing unit was occupied, but the questionnaire contained no information for all or most of the people, all characteristics for each person were allocated. This procedure differs from the method used for substitution in the stateside reports. In this report, all items were allocated, whereas, in the stateside reports, a complete set of characteristics for a person was assigned from a previously processed household.

These substitutions fall into two classes: (1) "mechanical failure," e.g., when the questionnaire page on which persons were listed was not properly microfilmed, and (2) "noninterview," e.g., when a housing unit was indicated as occupied but the occupants were not listed on the questionnaire.

Specific tolerances were established for the number of computer allocations and substitutions that would be permitted. If the number of corrections was beyond tolerance, the questionnaires in which the errors occurred were clerically

reviewed. If it was found that the errors resulted from damaged questionnaires, from improper microfilming, from faulty reading by FOSDIC of undamaged questionnaires, or from other types of machine failure, the questionnaires were reprocessed.

ALLOCATION AND SUBSTITUTION TABLES

The extent of allocation and substitutions in the editing process and their effect on each of the subjects are shown in tables B-1 to B-4 which follow table 18

(table 22 for the Virgin Islands of the United States). In these tables, "persons substituted" and "persons with one or more allocations" are stated as percentages of the total population.

In table B-1, since the procedure used for substitution was the allocation of a full set of characteristics for a person, substitutions were not tallied in the column "After substitution" but in "After substitution and allocation."

There is a difference in the method of counting allocations between table B-4 on the one hand, and tables B-2 and B-3 on the other hand. In table B-4, persons who were substituted (i.e., all characteristics were allocated) are included both

as being substituted and as having allocations. In tables B-2 and B-3, these persons are excluded.

Table B-3 shows allocation of marital status for all persons; tables B-1, B-2, and B-4 provide these data only for persons 15 years old and over.

The sum of the percentages of persons having assignments in each population characteristic is greater than the number of persons with one or more allocations because some persons had allocations for more than one characteristic. Not tallied, and therefore not included in these tables, are the allocations for missing information on quarter of year of birth; these allocations were made on a random basis.

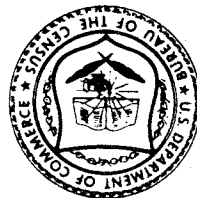
