# Survey Summary Report

### **General Population**

#### **Total Population**

The estimated population in Saipan as of fourth quarter, 2000, was 64,324 persons. About 55,286 persons lived in Census Bureaudefined "urban" areas – places of 2,500 or more – and 9,038 lived in rural areas.

By Census-defined Districts within Saipan, District 11 had the highest estimated population (17,516) followed by District 10 (14,247), District 6 (11,210), District 8 (8,052). Although District 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 had relatively smaller populations, they are contiguous, hence, constituting a densely populated area, from Susupe to Chalan Kanoa. (The Census Districts are based on 1980 established boundaries where, Districts 1, 2, 3, 4 are Chalan Kanoa, District 5 is Susupe, District 6 is San Antonio-Afetna-Koblerville, District 7 is San Jose-Chalan Laulau, District 8 is Tanapag-Capitol Hill-As Teo-Kagman I, District 9 is San Roque-As Matuis-Marpi, and District 10 is Kagman II and III-Papago-San Vicente-Dandan, and District 11 is Garapan-China Town-Navy Hill-Puerto Rico-Sadog Tasi.)

#### Median Age

The estimated median age of Saipan's population in the Fourth Quarter, 2000, was 28 years of age: that is half the population was older than 28 years and half was younger. Male's median age was 29 and female's was 27 years of age.

#### Sex Ratio

In Saipan, females (34,630) outnumbered males (29,694) by about 5,000. The sex ratio, the number of males for each 100 females, was 86.

#### Five-year Age Group

The largest five-year age group was age group "25-29" followed by age group "30-34", then "less than 5" years old. The large number of persons in ages between 20 through 54 reflects the large number of migrant workers residing in Saipan at the time of the Survey. As shown later, the large number of females in age group "25 to 34" include the large number of Chinese females working in the apparel industry at the time of Survey.


#### Citizenship

About 45 percent of Saipan's total population was US citizens while 55 percent was Non-US citizens, at the time of the Survey. Non-US citizenstemporary resident was 46 percent of Saipan's population while permanent resident was 9 percent.

Disproportionately more females (52 percent of all females) than males (39 percent of all males) were temporary residents. Again, this is because of the presence of the large number of female Chinese employed in Saipan at the time of the Survey.

#### Ethnicity

The largest ethnic group on Saipan, at the time of the Survey, was Asians, estimated at 57 percent of Saipan's total population. Among Asians in Saipan, Filipino was the largest single ethnic group, followed by Chinese. The largest pacific islander group was Chamorro which was 21 percent of Saipan's estimated total population. Filipino males was the largest male single ethnic group comprising one third of all males in Saipan. Chamorros followed at about one fourth of Saipan's male population. Chinese and Filipino females were about equal in numbers, (or 25 percent) each of the total females in Saipan. Chamorro female was the third largest female single ethnic group






which was 19 percent of Saipan's female population, at the time of Survey.

#### Birthplace

About 38 percent of the Saipan's population was born in the CNMI while 51 percent was born in Asia--25 percent in the Philippines, 18 percent in China. About 6 percent of Saipan's population was born in the Freely Associated States of Micronesia and 4 percent was born in the US mainland and other US territories.

### Migration

About 62 percent of Saipan's population was born elsewhere and migrated here. The age distribution of the local population (persons born in the CNMI) and the migrant population differed significantly. The age distribution of the local population is younger with a median and a mean age of 13 and 19.3 years. The age distribution of the migrant population is older with a median and a mean age of 31 and 32.1 years. The two different age distributions are shown in Chart 2.0 below. As shown later, the migrant population was comprised mostly of contract workers and business persons who fall







#### Reason for migration

The majority, 75 percent (29,984) of all immigrants came to the CNMI for employment. Smaller numbers came as spouses, family members, or dependents of employed persons, or as students, missionaries or other reasons.



#### Year of entry

Thirty seven percent of migrants came to Saipan between 1999 and 2000, another 20 percent came between 1997 and 1998, 10 percent came between 1995 and 1996, 15 percent came between 1990 and 1994 and the rest came prior to 1994. ### Labor Force Population

### Total Labor Force


Eighty-six percent (41,217) of all persons 16 years of age and older were in the labor force in Saipan, at time of the Survey. An estimated 39,104 persons were employed while an estimated 2,113 persons (or 5.1 percent) of the total labor force was unemployed.


### Labor Force Status by Age

Teens (15 to 19 year olds) and older adults (50 to 74 year olds) had lower labor force participation rates while young adults (20 to 49 year olds) had higher labor force participation rates. Young adults had lower unemployment rates compared to older adults. Eighty-seven (87) percent of Saipan's labor force was between ages 20 and 59 years of age.

#### Labor Force Status by Citizenship

Ninety-five percent of all non-US citizens in Saipan participated in the labor force while 67 percent of US citizens participated. US citizen's unemployment rate of 10.5 percent was higher than non-US citizen's 3.5 percent.






#### Labor Force Status by Ethnicity

Filipino was the largest single ethnic group at 37 percent of the total labor force in Saipan, at the time of the Survey. Chinese followed second at 28 percent, Chamorro was third at 18 percent. Micronesian was 7 percent, Carolinian was 4 percent and Caucasian was 3 percent of Saipan's labor force.

Unemployment rate was lowest for Chinese (1 percent) and highest for Caucasians (11.6 percent) in Saipan, at the time of the Survey.









#### Employment by Industry

The largest industry in Saipan, in terms of number of workers, was "manufacturing" which was almost entirely "apparel manufacturing". The second largest was "public administration", followed by "Retail trade", "accommodations" and so on. See Chart 7 below for percent distribution of workers by industry.

#### Employment by Citizenship

Seventy percent of Saipan's employed work force was temporary resident workers while 30 percent was made up of US citizens and permanent residents. By industry, US citizens and permanent residents were dominant in "management of companies and enterprises", "educational services", "public administration", "health care and social services", "finance and insurance", "utilities", "retail trade" and "information". Temporary resident workers were dominant in "mining, ag, forestry, and hunting", "manufactur-ing", "other services", "real estate", "food and drinking places", "accommodations", "admin, support, and waste management and remediation services", "art, entertainment and recreation", and "wholesale".




# Chart 7. Employed Persons Percent Distribution by Industry: Saipan, 4th Qtr., 2000



#### Employment by Ethnicity

As shown in Table 13 and Table 14, Chinese--who were mostly females-were concentrated in "manufacturing"; Chamorros and Carolinians were concentrated in "public administration"; Fillipinos outnumbered all ethnic groups in all industries, except in "manufacturing", "public administration", finance and insurance", "educational services" and "health care" and "social services". Micronesians were mostly in "apparel manufacturing", but also in "retail trade" and "accommodations".

#### Chart 9. Employed Chinese percent distribution by Industry: Saipan, 4th Qtr, 2000





#### **Employment by Occupation**

"Production, transportation, moving, handlers, helpers and laborers" was the largest occupational category (42 percent of all workers), followed by "managerial and professional occupations" (18 percent), "technical, sales, and administrative support" (15 percent), "services occupations" (14 percent), "precision production, craft and repair" (9 percent), then "farming, forestry, and fishing" occupations (1 percent).

Chinese were mostly in "production, transportation, moving, handlers, helpers and laborers".

#### Employment by Class of worker

Eighty-six percent (86%) of all employed persons in Saipan was "private for wage and salary" workers, 11 percent was "local government" workers, 2 percent was "selfemployed", and 1 percent was "Federal government" workers.

Fifty-five percent (55%) of working Chamorros was working for the government--51 percent for local government and 4 percent for the federal; 43 percent was in private for wage and salary, 2 was self-employed.

Eighty-five percent (85%) of Micronesians was in private for wage and salary, 12 percent in the local government, and 2 percent was self-employed.

Ninety-six percent (96%) of employed Asians was in private for wage and salary, 2 percent was in local government, and less than 2 percent was self-employed.

All employed Thai, 98 percent of Chinese, 96 percent of Filipino and 96 percent of Japanese were in "private for wage and salary".

## Personal Income

#### Income Distribution

Fifty-three percent of all persons who reported annual income reported annual income of less than \$10,000; 23 percent reported annual income between \$10,000 to \$19,999; 13 percent reported income between \$20,000 and \$49,999; and 4 percent reported annual income of \$50,000 or more. (Income statistics in this report are only for persons who lived in households and exclude persons who lived in company group quarters or barracks, at the time of the Survey.)


Males reported higher annual income than females. As shown in Table 17, male income distribution had a median of \$10,000 and a mean of \$18,701 which were higher than female's median of \$8,058 and mean of \$13,253.

#### Income by Age Group

Median annual income was low for age group "16 to 19" years old and was highest for persons in age group "55 to 59 years" old, as shown in Table 18.

US citizens had higher annual personal income compared to non-US citizens, as shown in Table 19.





Chart 13. Personal Median and Mean Annual Income by Ethnicity: Saipan, 2000




